MORE DEAD BIRDS TEST POSITIVE FOR WEST NILE VIRUS
--SYMVCD's Ongoing Surveillance Program Continues to Detect West Nile Virus Activity

ELK GROVE, Calif., August 10, 2006 – The Sacramento-Yolo Mosquito and Vector Control District (SYMVCD) received confirmation today that 46 dead birds have tested positive for West Nile virus. Most of the dead birds were found scattered throughout the Sacramento County area with a particularly high concentration in the Greenhaven and Pocket area.

The public is strongly urged to practice the District's **7Ds**: **DRAIN** any standing water that may produce mosquitoes. **DAWN** and **DUSK** are times to avoid being outdoors. These are the times when mosquitoes are most active. **DRESS** appropriately by wearing long sleeves and pants when outside. **DEFEND** yourself against mosquitoes by using an effective insect repellent, such as DEET, Picaridin or Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus. Make sure you follow all label directions! **DOOR** and window screens should be in good working condition. This will prevent mosquitoes from entering your home. **DISTRICT** personnel are also available to address any mosquito problem you may be experiencing. West Nile virus

According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), West Nile virus (WNV) is the leading cause of arboviral encephalitis in the United States. Originally discovered in Africa in 1937, WNV was first detected in the western hemisphere in 1999 in New York City. Since then it has caused seasonal epidemics of West Nile virus fever and severe neurological disease. West Nile virus is transmitted to humans and animals through the bite of an infected mosquito. Mosquitoes become infected with WNV when they feed on infected birds.

West Nile virus activity for Sacramento and Yolo Counties: This year, **71** dead birds, **56** mosquito pools, **6** sentinel chickens (presence of antibodies), **0** equines and **10** humans have tested positive for West Nile virus to date.
