3. Reports to the Board

Manager's Report:

The Manager discussed the state of West Nile virus activity and the continued findings of Aedes in the District. He informed the Board of a front office remodel that staff is investigating and will bring it back to the Board at a future meeting. He discussed the status of open enrollment and the increase in medical premiums.

Lab/Surveillance:

Lab Director Sarah Wheeler provided an update regarding the abundance of Culex tarsalis in Sacramento and Yolo counties. Populations have decreased greatly over the past month and are comparable to the previous five-year mean. West Nile virus activity gradually reduced throughout September, and only a single WNV-positive pools was detected in the first week of October. Thus far, 7,571 pools of Culex tarsalis and Culex pipiens were collected and tested for West Nile (WNV), Saint Louis encephalitis (SLEV), and western equine encephalitis viruses (WEEV). As of 10/6/2023 there were 340 and 292 WNV-positive pools collected in Sacramento and Yolo Counties, respectively. Additionally, there were three pools of Culex tarsalis that tested positive for SLEV in Yolo County. Thus far in 2023, 564 dead birds were

collected and tested for WNV, SLEEV, and WEEV; 251 tested positive for WNV (Sacramento County-190; Yolo County-61). Sentinel chickens at Iselton, Knights Landing, Rancho Murieta, and Dunnigan flocks have tested positive for WNV antibodies. Invasive Aedes surveillance for 2023 has found both Aedes aegypti (Carmichael, Elk Grove, Rancho Cordova, Sacramento, Rancho Murieta, Rio Linda, Sloughhouse, West Sacramento, and Winters) and Aedes albopictus (Carmichael and Sacramento). Surveillance for these invasive species is ongoing.

Ecological Management:

Kevin Combo submitted a written report.

Biological Control:

Ken Harris gave an update on fisheries activities in the month of September. The Fisheries Department continued with its pond cleaning and maintenance schedule. They finished cleaning one pond and plan on completing two more in the month of October. They are also preparing for the fall flooding of wetlands. They work closely with field technicians and their supervisors to monitor water quality and ensure effective fish stocking. Ken anticipates using approximately another 500-1000 pounds of mosquitofish for these fall flood-ups. The Fisheries department also extended their support to other departments as time allowed, mostly assisting Urban Operations with invasive Aedes inspections and treatments.

Larval and Adult Control:

Program Coordinator Marty Scholl reported on status of the end of the rice growing season for Yolo and Sacramento County. Marty also provided an update on the fall flooding program treatments being performed by UAV and Farm Air flying services. Marty gave an update on the aerial adulticide and larval treatments for both counties. Invasive aedes detections have been made in the areas of Rancho Murieta and Rio Linda.

Public Outreach:

During her Public Information and Education update, Luz talked about the various events the District is participating in during the month of October. She also discussed the 2023 advertising season coming to an end, fulfilling repellent wipe requests from various community organizations, social media updates and projects she is involved in as part of the MVCAC Public Relations committee.

4. Board Review and Consideration to Install Fencing Around Two Fish Ponds

Staff introduced the item highlighting the District's need to increase fish production by installing fencing around two additional ponds. The Board discussed the item and a motion was made by Trustee Denny and seconded by Trustee Burnett to accept the staff's recommendation. The vote was taken by roll call and the motion passed by the following vote: Ayes: 13, Noes: 0, Absent: 0.

5. Board/Staff Reports and Requests / General Discussion

The Manager discussed the upcoming MVCAC meeting in January. He informed the Board that the current contract with Farm Air, who is our aerial larvicide contractor, will be expiring at the end of the year. An Ad Hoc Committee of the Board was formed with Trustees LaTorre, Duty, and Darroch as members to work with the Manager on a Code of Conduct policy for Board members. A discussion about cancelling the November Board meeting was made. The Board discussed the item and a motion was made by Trustee Burnett and seconded by Trustee Denny to cancel the November meeting. The vote was taken by roll call and the motion passed by the following vote: Ayes: 13, Noes: 0, Absent: 0. The December meeting will be held on Tuesday December 19th at 10am.

6. ADJOURNMENT

The meeting adjourned at 11:02 a.m.

The Sacramento Yolo Mosquito and Vector Control District ("District") is submitting the anticipated 2024 Annual Operating Plan (Plan)* for monitoring and control of mosquitoes populations and mosquito-borne viral activity on lands managed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service ("Service") on the Stone Lake National Wildlife Refuge ("Refuge") or properties thereof, pursuant to Section 8 of the Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") between the "Service" and the Sacramento-Yolo Mosquito and Vector Control District.

STONE LAKES NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE ANNUAL OPERATING PLAN (MOSQUITO CONTROL)

2024

Access Requirements

The District will require access to all areas of Refuge properties to ensure comprehensive and integrated mosquito control. The District will continue to coordinate with "Service" staff to identify areas of concern to avoid negatively affecting sensitive resources.

Monitoring and Surveillance Programs

Pursuant to the District's Mosquito and Mosquito-borne Disease Management Plan (MMP)*, the monitoring methods will consist of larval sampling, utilization of adult traps such as but not limited to: BG Sentinel, Encephalitis virus surveillance ("EVS"), Gravid, and other adult traps, as well as leg counts, sentinel

chicken sera testing, and dead bird monitoring. Using these methods will enable the District to quantify mosquito prevalence in and around the Refuge, as well as identify when virus activity, particularly West Nile virus ("WNV") is present. In addition, the District asks for the help and support of the "Service" to monitor any unusual bird die-offs that may occur on the Refuge. As WNV is firmly established in the Sacramento Valley, help and assistance by the "Service" in identifying any such bird die-offs may help provide an early warning system to address WNV positive mosquitoes and potential breeding sites in the area of concern.

Genus and Species Thresholds

The District currently uses the larval density of 0.1 mosquito larva per 350 ml. dipper of water to initiate a larval control response. This threshold reduces nuisance levels of adult mosquitoes and has historically prevented the transmission of disease to the surrounding public. Adult mosquito thresholds are generally determined by historical levels of adult mosquitoes in the area. The District has established a standard goal of keeping *Culex sp.* female mosquitoes below threshold levels of 10 per light trap night or 100 per carbon dioxide (C0₂) baited trap per night when virus has not been detected. When virus activity is detected, these thresholds are significantly reduced according to the District's "Plan". When adult mosquitoes meet or exceed these established thresholds it may be necessary to implement an adulticide program to reduce adult mosquitoes to acceptable levels and to reduce or break the viral transmission cycle.

Non-invasive or nuisance genus *Aedes sp.* adult mosquitoes are generally determined by landing (leg) and adult trap counts. Landing count thresholds are generally reached when two or more non-invasive *Aedes sp.* land on an individual during a one-minute time interval. When adult mosquitoes meet or exceed tolerable levels, the District may initiate adult mosquito control activities.

The District has a <u>zero-tolerance</u> threshold for any larval or adult <u>invasive</u> *Aedes sp.* mosquitoes. Upon detection, the District may initiate additional surveillance and wide area larval or adult treatments in nearby affected residential and urban areas.

Physical, Cultural, Biological, and Chemical Control

The District uses an Integrated Pest Management ("IPM") approach when controlling mosquitoes or other vectors. For additional details and document downloads in regards to the District's " IPM" program, please visit the District's website at https://www.fightthebite.net/programs/integrated-pest-management/

Physical/Cultural and Environmental Manipulation

The District will continue to pursue water and vegetation Mosquito Reducing Best Management Practices ('BMPs") and techniques to help minimize larval development and prevent adult emergence wherever possible. Drawing on previous work by the Central Valley Joint Venture Working Group, the District has compiled a list of potential BMPs for a variety of land uses including managed wetlands, riparian areas, and irrigated agricultural fields. The District's Ecological Management Department will continue to work to evaluate and assess the efficacy of these BMPs on the Refuge to ensure that mosquito populations can continue to be reduced by physical/cultural and environmental manipulation practices.

At the beginning of the mosquito season, the District and "Service" staff will review the Refuge's annual management plans and flooding schedules and make recommendations to reduce or eliminate mosquito breeding sites by implementing mosquito reducing BMPs.

Biological Control

The District's Fisheries Department utilizes mosquitofish (*Gambusia affinis*) to augment our biological and chemical control program in appropriate bodies of water that will sustain mosquitofish populations. These biological control measures are used in areas that may be potential breeding sites for immature mosquito development or where chemical control is not practicable.

Chemical Control

Based on the District's (MMP), the District will utilize registered public health pesticides to control mosquito populations where environmental manipulation and biological control are not feasible. The District's first choice of materials will continue to be larvicides, with a particular focus on *Bacillus* based products and other insect growth regulators. The District will communicate with "Service" staff when Spinosad-based products must be utilized. Continued communication and coordination with "Service" staff will ensure the use of products that minimize impacts on important resources.

Larval Control Products (singular or in combination)

Bacillus thuringiensis israelensis (Bti)-All formulations

Bacillus sphaericus-All formulations

Methoprene -All formulations

Spinosad-All formulations

Larviciding/Mineral Oils

Adult Control Products

Pyrethroids -All liquid formulations

Pyrethrins -All liquid formulations

Malathion -All liquid formulations

A list of individual product labels will be provided before the start of the mosquito season for the Refuge to submit individual Pesticide Use Proposals (PUPs).

UAS (Drone) Operations

The District may utilize unmanned aircraft systems (UAS) units to provide aerial imagery, support, analysis, and localized treatments to improve the efficiency and efficacy of District operations. Any UAS use over Refuge lands <u>will</u> be preauthorized and approved by Refuge and USFWS Management and will only be used aiding in mosquito control operations.

Communication/Projection of Control Measures

All applications of registered public health pesticides are governed by the label, and to some degree meteorological conditions. While the District cannot determine the exact time or day when mosquitoes reach levels that warrant control measures, the District is determined to maintain the level of communication with "Service"" staff to maximize our efforts moving forward. Notifying the District prior to flooding or irrigation events minimizes the potential for conflict. The District will continue to inform "Service" staff when control activities involving adulticiding or the use of aerial applications are necessary. This type of open communication will enhance the operations, coordination, and effectiveness of both our agencies.

Reporting

The District will continue to generate and submit annual activity reports and subsequent maps detailing all treatments made on "Service" properties during the 2024 season as well as submitting weekly trapping data. The District will provide any additional information upon the request of the "Service".

Avoidance

The District will continue to coordinate with "Service" staff to minimize any disturbances on the 457 ac. Lewis Property between the dates of October 15 through February 15 and around all Refuge wetland complexes between the dates of September 1st and April 1st when Sandhill Cranes are typically present on the property. The District will avoid these areas before 9am (unless instructed otherwise). The District will collaborate with the "Service" to limit disturbances during the time-frame mentioned; however, if above-average temperatures,

excessive mosquito populations that emanate from the area, and/or the presence of WNV in or around the property are detected, the District may need to extend mosquito surveillance and control measures into these timeframes. The District will coordinate in advance with "Service" staff to minimize any potential impact from conducting control activities inside of the avoidance dates.

f. Authorize and Direct District Counsel to Provide Notice of Rejection of Claim

The District is in receipt of an administrative charge filed by Ms. McCormick with the California Civil Rights Department naming respondents as members of the California Public Employees" Retirement system. A revised claim related to CALPERS disability benefits was received on October 2, 2023 and deemed denied by operation of law (due to the cancellation of the November board meeting) on November 16, 2023. A copy of the claim is attached. Staff recommends that the Board authorize and direct District counsel to provide a written rejection notice to the claimant consistent with Government Code section 913.

To Whom It May Concern:

My firm represents Cari McCormick. Enclosed you will find an administrative charge, with exhibits, filed by Ms McCormick with the California Civil Rights Department, naming as respondents the California Public Employees' Retirement System, Lake County, and the State of California.

As the charge explains, Ms McCormick's claims concern how certain pension benefits are calculated and paid through CalPERS. Those claims are brought *on behalf of* a putative class of California public employees ("Plaintiff Class"). Those claims are brought *against* a putative class of California public entity employers who employed one or more members of the proposed plaintiff class ("Defendant Class"). Ms McCormick will propose that the State of California, as represented by the California Attorney General's Office, serve as class representative for the proposed Defendant Class.

We have reason to believe your public entity may have employed one or more members of the proposed Plaintiff Class, because your public entity contracts to pay pension benefits through CalPERS. For that reason, we are serving Ms McCormick's FEHA charge on your public entity pursuant to Government Code section 12962(b). In addition, to the extent the government claim presentation requirements may apply, we hereby present the enclosed charge as a government claim.

Exhibit A – Claim Narrative

Plaintiff Cari McCormick is an individual.

Defendants California Public Employees' Retirement System ("CalPERS"), State of California, and County of Lake are California governmental entities.

Plaintiff is ignorant of the true names or capacities of defendants named herein as Does 1 through 3,000, inclusive, and therefore identifies these defendants by these fictitious names. Each of the defendants named herein or designated as a Doe, is liable or in some manner legally responsible for the events alleged herein.

Plaintiff seeks to have the State of California, represented by the California Attorney General's Office, appointed to represent a defendant class, which includes all public entities that both employed one or more Plaintiffs, and are liable for employer-side retirement contributions for one or more Plaintiffs. A list of public entities believed to potentially be included within that defendant class, based on their listing as employers within the 2021-2022 Annual Comprehensive Financial Report published by CalPERS, is attached as Exhibit C.

Plaintiff refers to all defendants here collectively as "Defendants."

Plaintiff seeks to represent a plaintiff class of similarly situated persons. The class includes all persons who were employed by Defendants; who were at or over age 40 at the time they became members of the CalPERS system; who applied for and were granted ordinary disability retirement; whose retirement benefits are administered by CalPERS; and either (1) who have ever received disability retirement benefit payments pursuant to Government Code section 21423, who were over age 41 at membership in CalPERS, and who at retirement were credited with 18.518 or fewer years of actual service; or (2) who have ever received disability retirement benefit payments Code section 21098, and who at retirement were credited with 24.691 or fewer years of actual service; or (3) who have ever received disability retirement were credited with 24.691 or fewer years of actual service; or (3) who have ever received disability retirement were credited with 24.691 or fewer years of actual service; or (3) who have ever received disability retirement were credited with 24.691 or fewer years of actual service; or (3) who have ever received disability retirement were credited with 24.691 or fewer years of actual service; or (3) who have ever received disability retirement were credited with 24.691 or fewer years of actual service; or (3) who have ever received disability retirement were credited with 24.691 or fewer years of actual service; or (3) who have ever received disability retirement benefit payments pursuant to Government Code section 21424, and who at retirement were credited with 29.629 or fewer years of actual service.

Plaintiff was employed by County of Lake; was over age 40 at membership in CalPERS; applied for and was granted ordinary disability retirement; receives benefits administered by CalPERS; and presently receives monthly disability benefit payments pursuant to one of the sections listed above. *See, generally, McCormick v. Public Employees' Retirement System* (2019) 41 Cal.App.5th 428.

Plaintiff refers to herself and the proposed plaintiff class collectively as "Plaintiffs."

At all relevant times, each of the Defendants was the agent of each of the remaining Defendants and, in doing the things alleged herein, was acting with the course and scope of such agency.

Each of the Defendants' actions or omissions as alleged herein was ratified by each of the remaining Defendants. Each of the acts or omissions of a Defendant's agents as alleged herein was ratified by that Defendant, as well as by each of the remaining Defendants. Each of the Defendants had knowledge of unlawful discrimination practiced upon its employees by the other Defendants, and failed to thereafter take all reasonable steps to prevent further discrimination against its employees. Each of the Defendants provided substantial assistance or encouragement to the other Defendants in the discrimination alleged here, and thereby caused harm to Plaintiff and the proposed class. Each of the Defendants had knowledge of the discrimination alleged here, and cooperated in that discrimination. For purposes of the discrimination alleged here, each of the Defendants was a joint employer and engaged in a joint venture, including by engaging in a combination of resources to carry out a single undertaking, with each having separate ownership interests in the joint undertaking, joint control, and an agreement to share profits and losses of that joint undertaking.

California law governs Plaintiffs' retirement benefits, and provides for ordinary disability retirement benefits for certain public employees such as Plaintiff who are rendered unable to do their job by any non-industrial long-term disability.

California law calculates such ordinary disability retirement benefits in a way that discriminates based on advanced age at membership. Government Code sections 21098, 21424, and 21423 each provides for younger employees to receive an ordinary disability retirement benefit equal to at least 33.333% of their final compensation. By contrast, older employees receive significantly reduced benefits, because those benefits are based on imputed years of service through age 60. For example, assume two state miscellaneous first-tier employees are otherwise identical, except that one was hired at age 18, the other at age 49. Each puts in 10 years of actual credited service, and each is forced to retire due to disabilities. The 18-year-old-at-hire will receive a benefit equal to 33.333% of his final compensation, because the formula gives him service credit as if he had worked without interruption through age 60. By contrast, the 49-year-old-at-hire will receive a benefit equal to just 19.8% under section 21423, with the difference in benefit amounts solely due to the older employee's advanced age.

Defendants are liable for disparate treatment. Defendants are qualifying employers, and employed Plaintiffs. Plaintiffs were over age 40 at membership. Defendants paid Plaintiffs reduced retirement benefits compared to employees younger at membership. Plaintiffs' age over 40 at membership was a substantial motivating factor in Defendants' determination and payment of the amount of Plaintiffs' disability retirement benefits. Plaintiffs have been harmed. Defendants' payment of reduced benefits to Plaintiffs is a substantial factor in causing them harm.

Defendants are also liable for pattern-or-practice of intentional discrimination. Discrimination is Defendants' standard operating procedure, rather than an unusual practice, and that standard operating procedure is a substantial factor in harming Plaintiffs.

Defendants are also liable for disparate impact. Defendants are qualifying employers, and employed Plaintiffs. Plaintiffs were over age 40 at membership. Defendants maintained a common policy or practice that has a disproportionate adverse effect on persons over age 40 at membership. Plaintiffs have been harmed. Defendants' policy or practice was a substantial factor in causing Plaintiffs' harm.

Defendants are also liable for their failure to prevent discrimination against Plaintiffs. Defendants knew or should have known of the above-alleged discrimination, and failed to take all reasonable steps necessary to prevent the same from occurring, thereby causing harm to Plaintiffs.

Defendants are also liable for breach of contract. At hiring, Defendants promised Plaintiffs future pay in exchange for present work, and Defendants' monthly retirement benefit payments are wages paid after the fact for Plaintiffs' years of labor. *See, e.g., Kern v. Long Beach* (1947) 29 Cal.2d 848, 850-852. The retirement benefit provisions at issue are contractual terms of class members' employment agreements: by those retirement provisions, Defendants promised class members future pay in exchange for present work, and once class members began performance, class members obtained a vested contractual right to the benefits Defendants had promised. *See, e.g., McGlynn v. State of California* (2018) 21 Cal.App.5th 548, 559.

Defendants maintained express written contractual terms of employment that provided for class members to be paid reduced retirement benefits based on their advanced ages at hiring. See, Gov. Code §§ 21098, 21424, 21423. Those terms of employment violate or are contrary to overriding state laws (*i.e.*, Gov. Code § 12940, subd. (a)) regulating such terms of employment, by providing for reduced compensation based solely on an employees' advanced age at hiring. To that extent, those terms of employment are contrary to superseding state law, they are illegal contractual terms, they are contrary to public policy, and they are therefore void. See, Civil Code § 1667. The unlawful terms of Plaintiffs' contracts with Defendants are severable, such that the illegal contract terms should be severed, and the balance of the contracts enforced. Armendariz v. Found. Health Psychcare Servs., Inc. (2000) 24 Cal.4th 83, 124. With illegal contractual terms severed, class members' contracts with the Defendants provide for class members to receive equal retirement benefits.

Alternately, FEHA's prohibition on age discrimination constitutes a contractual term of employment implied by operation of law into Plaintiffs' employment agreements with Defendants, such that Defendants were subject to a contractual duty to pay nondiscriminatory retirement benefits. *See, Castillo v. Express Escrow Company* (2007) 146 Cal.App.4th 1301, 1308 ("all laws in existence when the agreement was made become part of the contract"); *Anderson v. Time Warner Telecom of California* (2005) 129 Cal.App.4th 411, 418 ("All applicable laws are presumed to be known by the parties and to form a part of the agreement as if those laws were expressly referred to and incorporated."); *Coral Farms, L.P. v. Mahony* (2021) 63 Cal.App.5th 719, 731 ("The incorporation of current law into a contract is presumed and does not require a deliberate expression by the parties.").

The terms of Plaintiffs' employment contracts were sufficiently clear that the parties could understand what each was required to do, the parties exchanged consideration, and the parties agreed to terms. Plaintiffs did all, or substantially all, of the significant things their contracts required of them. Defendants failed to pay non-discriminatory benefits under the contracts, or paid discriminatory benefits in violation of the contracts. Plaintiffs were harmed. Defendants' breaches of contract were a substantial factor in causing Plaintiffs' harm.

The harm to Plaintiffs includes the loss of retirement benefits, the loss of additional amounts of money each would have received had he or she not suffered such unlawful discrimination, and harm in the form of humiliation, mental anguish, and emotional distress.

Defendants are also liable for prospective relief for violations of California's Equal Protection clause. Such relief includes declaratory relief, injunctive relief, and issuance of writs of mandamus and/or prohibition.

Thus, Defendants' unlawful policies and practices as alleged adversely affect, in a similar manner, a class of persons of which Plaintiff is a member, and raise substantial questions of law and fact that are common to that class. For those reasons, Plaintiff files this charge on behalf of a class of all others similarly situated, and seeks to represent the same.

GIS Department Summary

During the 2023 season the GIS Department mapped 44,312 acres of rice, a 158% increase from last year. Heavy precipitation during the 2022 winter alleviated water restrictions which allowed rice growers to cultivate many of their fields. The GIS Department coordinated with Field Supervisors, aerial contractors and the Program Coordinator to provide the essential data and maps necessary to operate the District's rice program. This year, the GIS Department also worked on developing the District's drone department. By utilizing drone terrain surveys, videos and photos, the department was able to provide guidance on multiple projects including a BMP ditch construction for the Ecological Department. The GIS Department continues to work on improving the District's ULV navigation system while also providing data analysis and visualization for mosquito control.

Kara Kelley

Microbiologist

The Lab performs tick surveillance for Borrelia burgdorferi, the causative agent of Lyme disease, each year from November through May when the local vector Ixodes pacificus is most active. There are twenty established tick collection sites in Sacramento and Yolo Counties which are surveyed once per month. In 2023, excluding the month of December, 263 pooled collections of Ixodes pacificus were tested for Borrelia burgdorferi, of which 18 were positive from a total of eight collection sites. Beginning in mid-April, surveillance efforts shifted to West Nile virus (WNV). As part of our surveillance program, the laboratory maintains five flocks of sentinel chickens. Samples are collected and tested every two weeks for WNV, St Louis encephalitis virus, and western equine encephalitis virus. In 2023, we detected a total of 17 WNV positive chickens: five from Knights Landing, five from Dunnigan, five from Isleton, and two from Rancho Murieta. Collection and testing of dead birds is another part of our WNV surveillance program. This year the District tested 585 dead birds and 258 tested positive for WNV. This was a positivity rate of 44.1% which was more than double the positivity rate of 18.5% in 2022. The last component of our WNV surveillance program is collection and testing of mosquitoes. In 2023, we tested a total of 7,989 samples with 636 (342 from Sacramento County and 294 from Yolo County) samples testing positive for WNV, this is a positivity rate of 7.96% which is much higher than the rate of 2.0% observed in 2022. In addition to a busy WNV season, we detected three St. Louis encephalitis virus (SLEV) positive mosquito samples collected from our routine surveillance trapping program with two positive samples from Yolo County and one positive sample from Sacramento County. The last recorded detection of SLEV in our District boundaries was at least 50 years ago. The Microbiologist will continue to serve on the MVCAC Laboratory Technologies Committee for 2024.

Robert Fowler

Shop Supervisor

This year the shop had a change in supervisor roles with the retirement of Tom Price and the promotion of Robert Fowler to shop supervisor. The shop still operates with two full-time ASE certified mechanics performing repairs and maintenance among other duties. The shop integrated new equipment, shop management software and a new version of a vehicle check out system utilizing appsheet design. The new equipment is mostly installed and being used already to improve performance and function in the shop. The shop management software is changing and updating the scheduling and timing of services as well as creating new interaction between the various departments of the District. The shop will continue to look for ways to improve through technology and equipment as well as grow our knowledge about the Districts ever changing fleet.

Brett Day

North Yolo Field Supervisor

The 2023 year started off with an abundance of rain which kept the five (5) North Yolo technicians out of the field a little later than normal. We began inspecting and treating spring sources the first part of April with our first larval treatment on April 11. For the 2023 season North Yolo technicians inspected over 15,000 larval sources with over 950 treatments. Throughout the summer months we monitored just under 9,500 acres of conventional rice and 2,900 acres of organic rice with our first order submitted on June 6th. Our rice program turned in over 42,000 acres of rice for treatment throughout the summer and monitored another 3,900 acres in the Conaway Ranch that was on a weekly auto retreat program.

The North Yolo crew responded to 313 service requests this year (up from 52 in 2022). In 2023 North Yolo technicians responded to 151 West Nile positive mosquito pools with the first positive coming on June 28th in Dunnigan. The North Yolo crew also responded to 2 Saint Louis Encephalitis mosquito pools,11 West Nile Positive wild birds and 10 West Nile Positive sentinel chickens. In response to the positive mosquito pools North Yolo ran 38 Ultra Low Volume (ULV) fogging missions (21 nighttime and 13 early morning) with a total of 38,450 acres treated.


For the 2023 season North Yolo turned in for treatment 2,200 acres of spring and fall duck club flood ups.






Weekly Culex tarsalis abundance traps in locker and gravid traps.




Weekly Culex pipiens abundance traps in locker and gravid traps.

Encephalitis Vector Surveillance (EVS) – The majority of the EVS program was concluded for the season at the end of October. In response to Sanit Louis encephalitis virus (SLEV) human cases reported in Woodland and Isleton the District continued EVS trapping in these areas through November. Overall trap counts were low and all mosquito samples tested negative for West Nile virus (WNV), SLEV, and western equine encephalitis virus.

Dead bird surveillance – The dead bird program will resume in April 2024

Sentinel chickens – The sentinel chicken program is completed for the year and will resume in April 2024.


Rice surveillance – Counter traps have been collected from the rice fields. Surveillance will resume in May 2024.

Human disease response surveillance – As of 12/1/2023 there were 34 confirmed human cases of WNV in Sacramento County, and 25 cases in Yolo County. In addition each county had a single human case of SLEV. During October and November two human cases of malaria were investigated in Yolo County, no infected mosquitoes were detected.

Tick surveillance – Tick flagging started in November and all 20 permanent sites were flagged. Sites were selected based on land use and habitat. *Ixodes pacificus* were collected from 14 of the sites sampled. All *Ixodes pacificus* collections were separated by sex, collected in pools up to five ticks, and tested for *Borrelia burgdorferi*, the causative agent of Lyme disease. The following table shows the November collections for *Ixodes pacificus* and test results for *Borrelia burgdorferi*. The figure shows the overall monthly collection trends for *Ixodes pacificus* in Sacramento and Yolo Counties.

ECOLOGICAL MANAGEMENT DEPARTMENT

November/December 2023 Board Update

Ecological Management Projects

Mahon Pastures (Elk Grove)

The Mahon Water Management Project is a 23 ac. irrigated pasture located in the rural agricultural area south of Elk Grove. This project consisted of an existing pasture drain inundated with hoofprints from cattle (pugging) caused by irrigating the pasture while the livestock are present. These hoofprints hinder the flow of water and allow little pockets of water that are conducive for mosquito breeding, thus creating a 2.92 ac. mosquito breeding site in close proximity to populated areas. Ecological Management staff reset the existing culvert to grade and re-excavated an 1,197' drainage ditch that eliminated the pugging and will reduce the standing water in the pastures. Staff installed livestock crossings across the drain (provided by the landowner) for the livestock to use instead of crossing through the ditch which will allow irrigated waters to flow as intended. Staff made BMP recommendations to the landowner advising to relocate the livestock to adjacent pastures prior to irrigations to prevent future pugging.





Welch Property (Wilton)

This vegetation control project consists of an 1469' overgrown drainage ditch that is used to convey excess effluent from the Tsar Nicoulai Caviar Farm in Wilton, Ca. The drain is overgrown with Himalayan blackberries, willows, and cottonwood trees. Historically, staff have treated the drain with residual granular products as the emergent vegetation was too dense for liquid larvicides to be effective. Staff utilized the track loader with the brush cutting attachment to expose the drain and provided a walking/driving path next to the drain. This project will reduce the amount of residual products applied and will allow Control Operations staff to be more efficient while controlling mosquito populations via power sprayers with <u>less</u> expensive liquid larvicides.

Fall Flooding

The 2023 Fall Flooding program has ended and the waterfowl season is well underway. Prior to October 1st, staff recorded a total of 8319.7 acres flooded. 820.5 acres of federal property (Stone Lakes, Cosumnes River Preserve) 2432.14 acres of state property (Yolo Wildlife Area) and 5067.06 acres of private waterfowl clubs (7 private clubs).

In 2023, staff treated a total of 8861.7 acres of wetland habitat by utilizing fixed wing aircraft, drones and Argos. The total acreages this season decreased by approximately 700 acres in comparison to the 2022 season. It is surmised that the lack of water due to late rice planting and mechanical issues with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) lift pumps did not allow sufficient water in the delivery ditches to allow wetland managers to flood their fields prior to October 1st. All Fall Flooding Program cost sharing invoices have been sent out and the District is currently awaiting payments.

Cemeteries

In 2023, Laboratory and Ecological Management staff conducted a trial assessing the efficacy of a chemical treatment with the active ingredient Pyriproxyfen in cemetery vases. While additional trials will be conducted below are the results of the 2023 study.

Sumilarv cemetery vase trial 2023

Purpose

To assess Sumilarv 0.5G efficacy to provide continuous mosquito control in cemetery vases.

Background

The Sacramento and Yolo counties have an estimated 247,000 in-ground cemetery vases in over 37 cemeteries. Standing water in vases create prime breeding sites for mosquitoes which can transmit West Nile Virus and other vector-borne diseases. The Sacramento-Yolo Mosquito and Vector Control District routinely treats these cryptic sources with a variety of water absorbent products (polymer crystals) and larvicides, including Sumilarv 0.5G, an insect growth regulator that contains pyriproxyfen, a juvenile hormone analog that prevents mosquito larvae from developing to adulthood.

One of the main constraints with treating cemetery vases is that they tend to be routinely emptied from their contests, including water and larvicide, but they are immediately refilled by rain or the cemetery sprinkler systems, requiring constant treatment.

Objective

For this project we aim to test the efficacy of Sumilarv 0.5G in treating cemetery vases. Our rationale is that Sumilarv 0.5G might be able to impregnate the vase material providing constant larval control even after they have been emptied and refilled.

Materials and Methods

- Cemetery vases of three different materials, *plastic, zinc* and *metal*
- Mesh and rubber bands
- Sumilarv 0.5G in water soluble packages
- Distilled water
- Transfer pipettes or screen scoop
- Larval food

For this trial we tested three different vase types that are most commonly found in the Sacramento and Yolo cemeteries, which include; galvanized steel, zinc and plastic. We set up three different treatments with all 3 vase types which included; vases with constant water and product, vases initially treated, emptied, and then refilled with distilled water once a week and a control with no product. Each treatment was set with three replicates per vase type and 20, 3rd instar CQ1 larvae were added to assess emergence inhibition. We carried out the experiment for seven weeks, adding larvae on a weekly basis for the duration of the trial.

Results

For both zinc and plastic vases treated with and without constant water, we observed 100% emergence inhibition each week for the duration of the trial. However for the metal vase, although we observed 100% emergence inhibition with and without constant water, we also observed mortality in our control therefore we will repeat the experiment to address the issue.

Overall, our study indicates that treating the vases one time provides continuous control even when the water is removed.




Figure 1. Emergence inhibition percentage by treatment and vase type. Each dot represents the average of three replicates. Total number of mosquitoes per replicate was 20 larvae.

BIOLOGICAL CONTROL Monthly Report for December 2023 Board Meeting

In November, the Fisheries Department completed stocking of our fall flood-up sources. Fisheries technicians stocked 846 pounds of mosquitofish from October 1st through November 5th, covering 2,595 acres. To date, we've distributed a total of 3,437 pounds of mosquitofish, covering 15,741 acres in total. During this period, the department completed restocking the netted ponds, and these fish will overwinter before being redistributed to our open grow-out ponds in the spring. The district also entered into an agreement with a fencing company that is completing work on installing fencing around two more of our ponds. This will increase the overall holding capacity for fish throughout the winter. Fisheries staff will now begin the installation of new netting over these ponds. In addition to these efforts, the district interviewed candidates for a full-time position and hired a technician who joined the department on November 1st. Daily activities such as water quality testing and tank cleaning are continued to maintain high-quality fish. Weed removal and general maintenance were also performed.

CONTROL OPERATIONS Monthly Report for December 2023 Board Meeting

Culex and West Nile Virus (WNV) Control

Lower evening and daytime temperatures have slowed overall mosquito activity throughout the District. Larger fall flooded ponds, re-flooded rice fields, and other fall sources were treated in October and November. Service requests have dwindled but crews will respond as they are turned in as we move into 2024. Crews have started on annual source brush projects and District maintenance and construction projects.

Aerial Applications

UAS treatments ended the mosquito season with a total of 3,481 acres treated. The total acreages were down from last year due to the delay in the rice season and less areas flooded early for fall habitat.

Yellow Jacket Control


Sacramento Control Operations continued treating high population areas of yellow jackets around residential homes and trails. A handful of nests were found as late as December.

Invasive Aedes Control

Invasive Aedes continue to be found into December. No new areas were detected in the later fall months; however small adult numbers were detected in locally placed traps through the month of November. The Aedes crew continued to treat backyards as adults were found. Current temperatures have now dropped low enough in December to prevent detections in the known areas.

Trainings and Continued Education

Training modules for continued education of the Certified Vector Control Technicians licensing are being prepared for staff to begin in late December. Annual District pesticide and workplace safety training is being developed for a March 2024 training date.

School Program:

Currently school assemblies are being scheduled to begin in January 2024.

Presentations:

Two presentations were recently offered; the first to the Laguna Sunrise Rotary Club where we were able to provide West Nile virus and invasive mosquitoes information specific to the Elk Grove area. The second presentation was given to the UC Davis Entomology Club as part of a career exploration series of talks. Students were excited to learn about the various career paths relating to entomology, biology and general mosquito control. As a UCD graduate I discussed my own career path as a communications professional and various other positions available in a mosquito control setting. Students were engaged, had many thoughtful questions and enjoyed the presentation.

Events:

We have started getting information for upcoming community events in 2024. We are starting to review these as well as put together a list of tentative events we will attend. The first two events being considered are the Galt Bird Festival on February 3rd

Advertising:

5. Board Review and Consideration for Renovation of Front Office

Staff Report

The District facility in Elk Grove has expanded personnel, and specifically the front office staff. Office space is becoming a premium and a better use of the front entryway seems ideal to address the space issues. Staff has investigated a more efficient use of space in the front entryway to include the construction of offices and a remodel for staff.

The District has received quotes from three vendors and are included for your review. A summary of the quotes are as follows:

All vendors were asked to provide quotes using prevailing wage. The District has checked their licenses to make sure that they are all current and in good standing.

The District would like to proceed with Flipspaces as highlighted in their quote. They came in as the mid bidder and have many local projects that we were able to review. In addition, they are accredited by the Better Business Bureau. The District will work with Counsel on signing the appropriate contract.

Recommendation:

Authorize the Manager to enter into a contract with Flipspaces to begin the front office remodel with an amount not to exceed \$300,000.

6. <u>Board Review and Consideration of Contract with Farm Air for</u> <u>Aerial Larviciding Services</u>

Staff Report:

The District's contract for aerial larvicide work expires at the end of 2023. The market for aerial larviciding work is very slim and there are not a lot of options. We have been using Farm Air for a very long time with the primary work being completed over rural/agricultural areas of Sacramento and Yolo Counties.

Farm Air has a strong history of being responsive to the District's needs and is a key factor to successfully suppressing both mosquito abundance and West Nile virus transmission in agricultural areas. In a typical year the District flies around 300 hours with Farm Air, totaling approximately \$435,000 each season.

The contract has an increase in the rate from \$1450 to \$1600 per hour. However, if we make a prepayment of \$250K, then they will lower the hourly rate to \$1520 for the life of the contract. The District made prepayments in the amount of \$200K each of the past two years.

Recommendation:

Authorize the Manager to enter into a two year contract with Farm Air and to make the prepayment amounts by the due dates for the upcoming two mosquito seasons as highlighted in the attached letter.

Farm Air is interested in renewing the Sacramento Yolo Mosquito & Vector Control Aerial Application Contract for a two-year term, effective January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2025.

Our Bid is as follows:

- Hourly larvicide rate \$1600.00
- Hourly larvicide rate is \$1520.00 if prepayment is applied to the contract
- Fuel surcharge will be: For every .10 cents above \$2.00 a gallon, a surcharge of 1% (ex: fuel= \$2.30 per gallon, 3% of \$1600.00 additional= total \$1648.00)

A 5% discount will be applied to pre-payments received by dates listed below.

- If a prepayment of \$250,000.00 is received before March 1, 2024, the hourly larvicide rate will be \$1520.00 per hour and will remain at that rate for the remainder of the calendar year.
- The same hourly rate parameters will be applied for the 2025 year if the prepayment is received by January 1, 2025.

Farm Air provides service 7 days a week from April 15th through July 1st. After the 1st of July, all Saturday work will be 25% more per hour and Sunday work will be 50% more per hour. From July 1 until the following April 15, all Saturday and Sunday work will not be performed unless approved in writing by the District.

We highly encourage getting work orders in by the end of Tuesday to allow sufficient application time. We are utilizing two AT502B aircraft now, to also help the SYMVC District complete work during the workweek.

We will continue to accept deliveries, offload and manage the delivery of all materials used by the district. We provide a secure, dedicated storage area for the product and manage and file the monthly Pesticide Use Reports. We will continue to have a successful relationship with your staff.

Farm Air would love to continue to provide successful applications with SYMVC and would appreciate your support in accepting our proposal for the 2024-2025 term, given our history and longstanding relationship.
