**Roll Call**

This meeting was in person. Attendance was taken by Roll Call.

**Pledge of Allegiance**

**1. Board Review and Discussion of the District 2024-2025 Audit**

Justin Williams, Partner at MUN CPAs, introduced the 1<sup>st</sup> draft of the 2024-25 District Audit. Mr. Williams noted it was timely and the prior year recommendations were implemented. MUN CPAs did not identify any material deficiencies in internal control and when asked to translate his presentation in layman terms, expressed to the Board that the District deserves an “A”.

On a motion by Trustee Burnett and seconded by Trustee McGarvey, the Board voted to approve the 2024-2025 District Audit. Voice vote was taken and the motion passed unanimously, 12-0.

**2. Items for Approval by General Consent**

- b. Expenditures for December 2025
- c. Board Review and Consideration of District Annual Safety Committee Report
- d. Board Review and Consideration of Temporary Work Assignment

Trustee Karpinski-Costa thanked the District for such thorough and effective safety committee and standards. The nature of the District’s work is subject to various hazards but the District’s commitment to safety is to keep employees safe. The Manager added that VCJPA rates our ex-mod, which is an indicator of risk and frequency of accidents, as low despite the District’s large size.

On a motion by Trustee Mooney and seconded by Trustee Burnett, the Board voted to approve the General Consent Items. Voice vote was taken and the motion passed unanimously, 12-0.

**3. Opportunity for Public Comment**

None

**4. Reports to the Board**

Manager’s Report: The Manager announced that the District is recruiting for open positions and preparing for seasonal employment. The MVCAC and AMCA conferences are coming soon and travel arrangements have been made.

The District is working with the University of Kentucky and MosquitoMate on the possibility of rearing Wolbachia infected mosquitoes onsite. Management is pricing modular trailers for space to conduct this. The trailer would need power, HVAC and restrooms. The District intends to grow the SIT program in the 2026 season (ideally by 10x up to 40-50x). Results from the SIT effort will be presented by the Lab Director at AMCA and to the Board in February.

**5. Board Review of the District's 5-Year Plan**

Assistant Manager Ramos introduced the District's updated 5-year plan. He highlighted the new IT Specialist position as impactful due to improved mobile communications. The SIT awareness program was successful and will continue. Larval site analysis has been implemented and will be ongoing annually. Aux room renovation and extended parking is now complete. The NeoGov Suite changeover is also complete, as is the 2025 fleet exchange and equipment retrofit.

Goals highlighted for the future include-AI use policy implementation, evaluation of service intake process, 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the District, renovations/remodeling evaluations of structures and equipment and growth chambers.

**6. Board Review and Consideration of Contract with Farm Air for Larviciding Services**

The Manager described the price increase associated with the new Farm Air contract and recommended approval for the Board to approve execution of the contract.

On a motion by Trustee Karpinski-Costa and seconded by Trustee Mooney, the Board voted to authorize the Manager to work with our legal counsel and enter into a contract with Farm Air. Voice vote was taken and the motion passed unanimously, 12-0.

**7. Board Review and Consideration of Contract with VDCI for Aerial Adulticiding Services**

The Manager explained the highlights and price increase related to the new VDCI contract and recommended a contingency contract with Dynamic on an as-needed basis.

On a motion by Trustee Burnett and seconded by Trustee Karpinski-Costa, the Board voted to authorize the Manager to work with our legal counsel and enter into a contract with VDCI for Aerial Adulticiding Services and enter into a contingency contract with Dynamic. Voice vote was taken and the motion passed unanimously, 12-0.

**8. Closed Session – Public Employee Performance Evaluation (Government Code Section 54957): Manager**

The Board went into closed session at 11:35 a.m. and finished at 12:05 p.m. District Counsel reported out of closed session that “In closed session, the Board met, completed the annual review of General Manager met and considered an increase to his salary”.

Trustee Karpinski-Costa left the meeting at 11:35 a.m.

Trustee Garcia-Cadena left at 11:55 a.m.

**9. Board Review and Consideration for Approval of Amendment to General Manager Employment Agreement**

The Board approved an increase to the General Manager's monthly base salary and retirement contribution made by the District on his behalf retroactive to January 1, 2026. Direct staff and counsel shall prepare a new contract for approval by the Board at the February meeting.

**10. Board Consideration and Approval of District Officers for President, Vice President and Secretary, and Delegating the Manager to Perform the Responsibilities of the Secretary**

Trustee Mooney made the following nominations:

President: Trustee Darroch

Vice President: Trustee Gardiner

Secretary: Trustee Reisen

All nominees accepted the nominations.

On a motion by Trustee Mooney and seconded by Trustee Burnett, The Board voted to approve the nominations and delegated the responsibilities of Board Secretary to the General Manager. Voice vote was taken and the motion passed unanimously, 10-0.

**11. Board/Staff Reports and Requests**

The General Manager discussed the upcoming AMCA and MVCAC conferences, confirmed attendance, reservations, and accommodations. He also notified Board members that they are now required to take a finance class in accordance with SB 827. Next month the District will present options for security cameras. The District will explore upgrading the insectary and where an expanded SIT program could be performed. The Manager also introduced the prospect of engaging with a stipend-based grant writer to seek and apply for grants on behalf of AMCA as an additional measure to fund the AMCA Research Foundation.

**12. ADJOURNMENT**

The meeting adjourned at 12:24 p.m.

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The Board of Administration, California Public Employees' Retirement System, hereinafter referred to as Board, and the governing body of the above public agency, hereinafter referred to as Public Agency, having entered into a contract effective September 1, 1950, and witnessed August 11, 1950, and as amended effective August 1, 1968, October 1, 1975, December 8, 1978, December 1, 1981, November 1, 1892, September 18, 1991, September 20, 2000, and December 1, 2002, which provides for participation of Public Agency in said System, Board and Public Agency hereby agree as follows:

- A. Paragraphs 1 through 12 are hereby stricken from said contract as executed, effective December 1, 2002, and hereby replaced by the following paragraphs numbered 1 through 14 inclusive:
1. All words and terms used herein which are defined in the Public Employees' Retirement Law shall have the meaning as defined therein unless otherwise specifically provided. "Normal retirement age" shall mean age 55 for classic local miscellaneous members and age 62 for new local miscellaneous members.
  2. Public Agency shall participate in the Public Employees' Retirement System from and after September 1, 1950, making its employees as hereinafter provided, members of said System subject to all provisions of the Public Employees' Retirement Law except such as apply only on election of a contracting agency and are not provided for herein and to all amendments to said Law hereafter enacted except those, which by express provisions thereof, apply only on the election of a contracting agency.

3. Public Agency agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS) and its trustees, agents and employees, the CalPERS Board of Administration, and the California Public Employees' Retirement Fund from any claims, demands, actions, losses, liabilities, damages, judgments, expenses and costs, including but not limited to interest, penalties and attorney fees that may arise as a result of any of the following:
  - (a) Public Agency's election to provide retirement benefits, provisions or formulas under this Contract that are different than the retirement benefits, provisions or formulas provided under the Public Agency's prior non-CalPERS retirement program.
  - (b) Any dispute, disagreement, claim, or proceeding (including without limitation arbitration, administrative hearing, or litigation) between Public Agency and its employees (or their representatives) which relates to Public Agency's election to amend this Contract to provide retirement benefits, provisions or formulas that are different than such employees' existing retirement benefits, provisions or formulas.
  - (c) Public Agency's agreement with a third party other than CalPERS to provide retirement benefits, provisions, or formulas that are different than the retirement benefits, provisions or formulas provided under this Contract and provided for under the California Public Employees' Retirement Law.
4. Employees of Public Agency in the following classes shall become members of said Retirement System except such in each such class as are excluded by law or this agreement:
  - a. Employees other than local safety members (herein referred to as local miscellaneous members).
5. In addition to the classes of employees excluded from membership by said Retirement Law, the following classes of employees shall not become members of said Retirement System:
  - a. **SAFETY EMPLOYEES.**
6. The percentage of final compensation to be provided for each year of credited prior and current service as a classic local miscellaneous member in employment before and not on or after December 1, 2002 shall be determined in accordance with Section 21354 of said Retirement Law (2% at age 55 Full).
7. The percentage of final compensation to be provided for each year of credited prior and current service as a classic local miscellaneous member in employment on or after December 1, 2002 shall be determined in accordance with Section 21354.4 of said Retirement Law (2.5% at age 55 Full).

8. The percentage of final compensation to be provided for each year of credited prior and current service as a new local miscellaneous member shall be determined in accordance with Section 7522.20 of said Retirement Law (2% at age 62 Full).
9. Public Agency elected and elects to be subject to the following optional provisions:
  - a. Section 20042 (One-Year Final Compensation) for classic members only.
  - b. Section 20965 (Credit for Unused Sick Leave).
  - c. Section 20903 (Two Years Additional Service Credit).
  - d. Section 21623.5 (\$5,000 Retired Death Benefit).
  - e. Section 21548 (Pre-Retirement Option 2W Death Benefit).
  - f. Section 21151 (Industrial Disability Retirement for Local Miscellaneous Members).
  - g. Section 21428 (Increased Industrial Disability Allowance to 75% of Final Compensation).
  - h. Section 21427 (Improved Nonindustrial Disability Allowance).
  - i. Section 21540.5 (Special Death Benefit – Violent Act).
  - j. Section 21573 (Third Level of 1959 Survivor Benefits).
  - k. Section 21023.5 (Public Service Credit for Peace Corps, AmeriCorps VISTA, or AmeriCorps Service).
10. Public Agency, in accordance with Government Code Section 20790, ceased to be an "employer" for purposes of Section 20834 effective on October 1, 1975. Accumulated contributions of Public Agency shall be fixed and determined as provided in Government Code Section 20834, and accumulated contributions thereafter shall be held by the Board as provided in Government Code Section 20834.
11. Public Agency shall contribute to said Retirement System the contributions determined by actuarial valuations of prior and future service liability with respect to local miscellaneous members of said Retirement System.
12. Public Agency shall also contribute to said Retirement System as follows:
  - a. Contributions required per covered member on account of the 1959 Survivor Benefits provided under Section 21573 of said Retirement Law. (Subject to annual change.) In addition, all assets and liabilities of Public Agency and its employees shall be pooled in a single account, based on term insurance rates, for survivors of all local miscellaneous members.

- b. A reasonable amount, as fixed by the Board, payable in one installment within 60 days of date of contract to cover the costs of administering said System as it affects the employees of Public Agency, not including the costs of special valuations or of the periodic investigation and valuations required by law.
  - c. A reasonable amount, as fixed by the Board, payable in one installment as the occasions arise, to cover the costs of special valuations on account of employees of Public Agency, and costs of the periodic investigation and valuations required by law.
13. Contributions required of Public Agency and its employees shall be subject to adjustment by Board on account of amendments to the Public Employees' Retirement Law, and on account of the experience under the Retirement System as determined by the periodic investigation and valuation required by said Retirement Law.
14. Contributions required of Public Agency and its employees shall be paid by Public Agency to the Retirement System within fifteen days after the end of the period to which said contributions refer or as may be prescribed by Board regulation. If more or less than the correct amount of contributions is paid for any period, proper adjustment shall be made in connection with subsequent remittances. Adjustments on account of errors in contributions required of any employee may be made by direct payments between the employee and the Board.

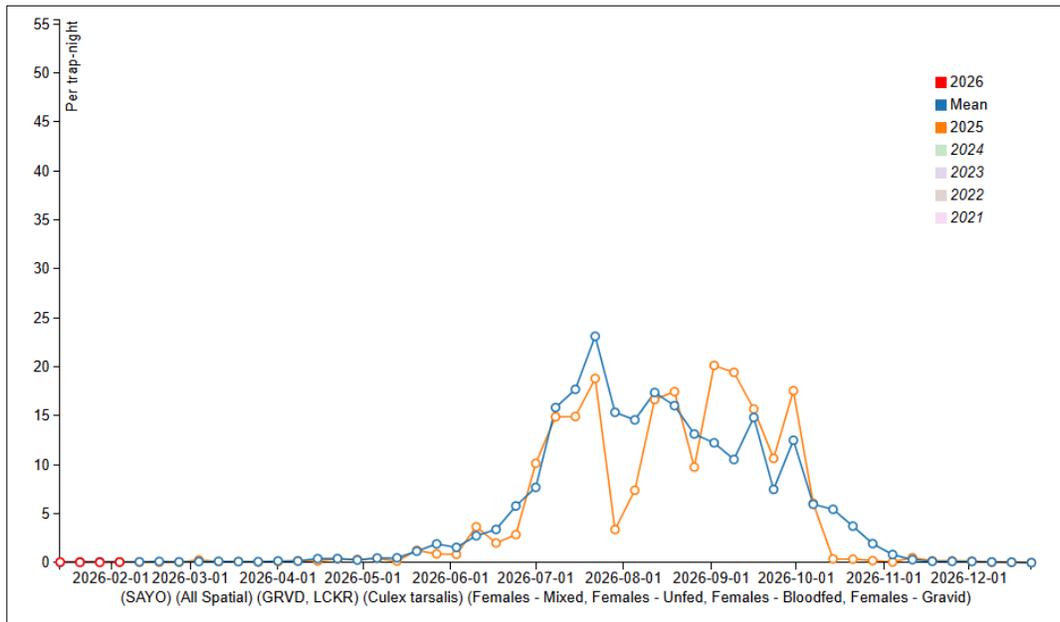

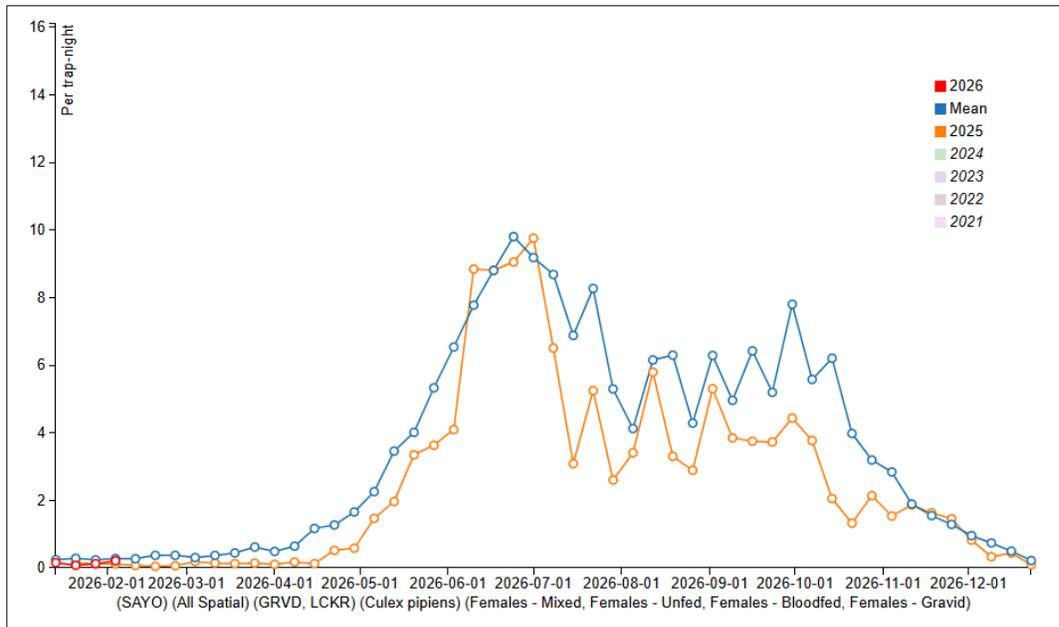

### Surveillance update through 2/5/2026

**Weekly mosquito collections** – The following graphs show overall *Culex tarsalis* and *Culex pipiens* abundance from gravid traps and locker traps placed in permanent locations throughout Sacramento and Yolo Counties. These traps run year-round and provide stable abundance data.



*Culex tarsalis* abundance in constant operation locker and gravid traps.



*Culex pipiens* abundance in constant operation locker and gravid traps.

**Encephalitis Vector Surveillance (EVS)** – This program will resume in May, 2026.

**Dead bird surveillance** – The dead bird program will resume in April 2026.

**Rice surveillance** – Surveillance will resume in May 2026.

**Human disease response surveillance** – Since the last report, no new human cases were reported to the District.

***Aedes aegypti* trapping effort in Sacramento and Yolo Counties** – Surveillance for *Aedes aegypti* will resume in April, 2026. A summary of the 2025 releases of *Wolbachia* infected males in Natomas will be presented.

**The California Arbovirus Surveillance Bulletin updates will resume in May 2026**

**Tick surveillance** – Tick surveillance is on-going. Each permanent site is flagged once per month. Collection sites were selected based on land use and habitat. All *Ixodes pacificus* collections were separated by sex, collected in samples up to five ticks, and tested for *Borrelia burgdorferi*, the causative agent of Lyme disease. The following table shows the number of ticks collected by city and the minimum infection prevalence for *Borrelia burgdorferi*.

## ECOLOGICAL MANAGEMENT DEPARTMENT

### February 2026 Board Update

#### Ecological Management Projects

##### Coupe Dairy (Galt)

The Coupe Dairy project, situated on the outskirts of Galt, involves the management of a dairy holding pond that collects a mixture of manure water and freshwater from multiple irrigation drains in the surrounding fields. However, the pond's surroundings have become overgrown with invasive vegetation, including Himalayan blackberry (*Rubus armeniacus*) and poison oak (*Toxicodendron diversilobum*), as well as downed trees and deadfall, making it challenging for District staff to access the area for inspections and treatments. To address this issue, District staff have taken steps to brush cut trails along the pond, aiming to create safe access paths and enhance the effectiveness of larval suppression treatments. By clearing the dense vegetation, staff can more easily monitor the pond's conditions and apply targeted treatments to reduce larval populations, ultimately reducing the adult mosquito population in the area.

*Delta Meadows- (Walnut Grove)*

Delta Meadows, a 127-acre park situated near the towns of Locke and Walnut Grove in South Sacramento County, is collaboratively managed by California State Parks and the United States Bureau of Reclamation. The site features an extensive network of ditches and drains designed to channel winter effluent to a pump, which then conveys water through a levee system into Snodgrass Slough. However, the outlet pump is in urgent need of repair, and the surrounding levee has eroded, rendering the discharge system inoperable. Compounding these issues, the drains are overgrown with invasive and native vegetation, including Himalayan blackberry (*Rubus armeniacus*), poison oak (*Toxicodendron diversilobum*), and wild rose (*Rosa woodsii*), as well as obstructed by fallen trees spanning their channels. These barriers hinder access for technicians conducting mosquito control operations. To address this, staff initiated a vegetation management project, clearing pathways to improve access and enhance the efficacy of larvicide applications.



**BIOLOGICAL CONTROL**  
**Monthly Report for February 2026 Board Meeting**

In January, staff continued preparing for the upcoming season. Additional fencing around two ponds is nearly complete, and staff will be replacing an existing worn net on one of the ponds.

Another full seine was conducted on the cement perch pond in collaboration with CDFW staff. Fish were collected for health examinations, and a future seine will be scheduled to remove the remaining perch off-site prior to cleaning and preparing the pond for the next rearing cycle.

Progress continues on the earthen perch pond, with rock, netting, and other materials ordered. Fencing and predator exclusion work is scheduled to begin in mid-February.

The department also donated fish to a middle school in the Davis area for the second year in a row in support of a student ecosystem project, which this year expanded to all 7th grade classes.

The Fisheries Department continued to complete annual training modules and required continuing education. Daily activities such as water quality testing and tank cleaning continued to maintain high-quality fish. Equipment maintenance, landscaping, and pond fertilization will continue into the spring.

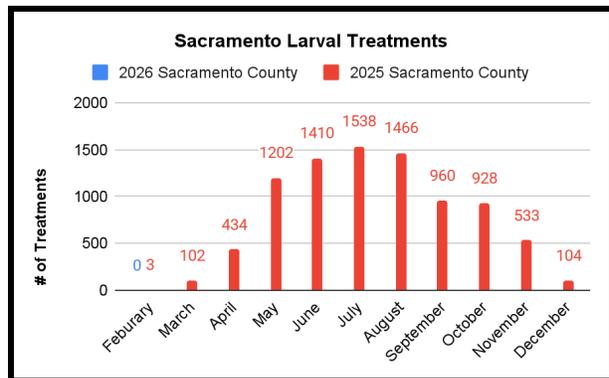
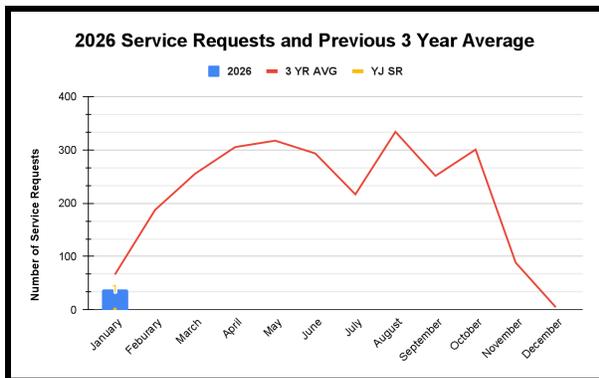

## CONTROL OPERATIONS Monthly Report for the February 2026 Board Meeting

### Culex, West Nile Virus (WNV) and General Mosquito Control

No response was needed for WNV or general control in the month of January for both counties. As the afternoons and evenings trend warmer, it is anticipated service requests will increase along with a few early season treatments.



No aerial or larval applications have been performed in 2026.

No Aedes detections or services have been performed in 2026.

### Trainings, Continued Education, and Winter Projects

Staff continue to complete annual education and required safety training and gearing up for the coming season.

Staff have also cleaned and calibrated most of the ground based control equipment for the season and outfitted their trucks after repairs and maintenance have been performed.

**Monthly Report for February 2026 Board Meeting**

**Outreach Events**

Community outreach and education efforts are ramping up as we begin planning for the 2026 events season. We are currently reviewing event applications and developing a recommended list of outreach opportunities for the year. Recently, staff participated in the Galt Bird Festival, where we engaged with residents on bird surveillance activities and discussed the role birds play in West Nile virus monitoring. The event provided a great opportunity to connect with both children and adults, who showed strong interest in learning about mosquitoes, mosquitofish, and the wide range of services provided by the District.

**Advertising**

As part of the *Fight the Bite* advertising campaign, we will continue working with media consultant Gary Benjamin to oversee media placements once the advertising plan is approved. Market data and audience trends are currently being reviewed to inform the overall strategy and support finalization of the plan in the coming months.

Upcoming meetings with account executives will focus on evaluating media proposals for the next campaign. In response to ongoing late-season detections of invasive mosquitoes, we plan to extend the media buy through the end of October. This approach will allow us to strengthen messaging around invasive mosquitoes during peak activity periods and adjust placements as new detection areas emerge.

**School Program**

Our school outreach program remains active, with “*What Bugs You*” assemblies—coordinated in partnership with Red Shoe Productions—continuing at schools throughout the region. In January, four assemblies were held, reaching a total of 710 students in grades 2 through 4, along with teachers and other school staff.

**Outreach materials**

In preparation for the upcoming season, we are currently taking inventory and re-ordering materials that will be distributed at all upcoming events and outreach activities.

**MVCAC Public Relations**

A presentation titled “The Buzz Behind the Release: Public Outreach Strategies for a Sterile Insect Technique Pilot Program” was given at the recent 2026 MVCAC Conference. In addition, as part of the Public Relations Committee, I am collaborating on a West Nile survivor testimonial project as part of our ongoing charges.

### 4. Board Review and Consideration of \$400,000 to Fund the Public Outreach Advertising Plan for the 2026 Mosquito Season

#### Staff Report:

The District’s Public Information and Education Department leads year-round public outreach efforts to inform and engage residents of Sacramento and Yolo counties on mosquito prevention and public health. Through a coordinated advertising and education strategy, the Department works to:

- Raise awareness about mosquitoes and how communities can help reduce breeding
- Address the ongoing and increasing threat posed by invasive *Aedes* mosquitoes
- Highlight the District’s role in preventing and controlling mosquito-borne diseases
- Encourage residents to take simple, proactive steps to “fight the bite”

Mosquito-borne diseases and invasive mosquitoes continue to pose a significant public health concern in California. In 2025, there were 111 reported human cases of West Nile virus statewide. In addition, both travel-related and locally acquired cases of dengue continue to occur, highlighting the need for sustained public education and outreach. These trends reinforce the importance of delivering consistent messaging that helps residents protect themselves and reduce mosquito breeding around their homes. As part of this effort, the District will continue to support public awareness related to expanded invasive mosquito control activities, including the Sterile Insect Technique (SIT), in select communities.

#### **2026 Campaign Overview**

Building on the outcomes and insights from recent campaigns, the District’s Public Information and Education Department will continue to refine and strengthen its outreach strategy in 2026. Key objectives include:

- Strengthening and extending awareness of the District’s protective efforts, services, and resources
- Increasing the volume and visibility of messaging related to invasive mosquitoes and the heightened risks they pose
- Continuing to use the recent community survey as a roadmap to guide messaging, media selection, and audience targeting—particularly to expand digital outreach to younger adults and families
- Further optimizing investment in digital and streaming platforms in response to evolving media consumption habits
- Expanding targeted outreach in Yolo County, where survey data and campaign performance indicate opportunities to increase awareness
- Supporting targeted outreach for invasive mosquito control initiatives, including expanded Sterile Insect Technique (SIT) activities in select communities

- Encouraging community participation by reinforcing why mosquito control matters and how residents can play an active role
- Building public trust by reinforcing the District’s role as a consistent, reliable, and responsive public health resource and directing residents to the District’s website for additional information
- Extending campaign messaging through October, when invasive mosquitoes remain active and risks often increase

**Data Driven Strategy:**

As in previous years, the 2026 advertising campaign will be guided by data analysis and performance insights to ensure efficient and effective use of resources. This approach allows the District to:

- Identify and prioritize key target audiences, including homeowners, families with children, seniors (55+), outdoor enthusiasts, and women
- Maximize reach and frequency within these audiences
- Adjust media allocations based on evolving media consumption trends
- Track campaign performance and audience engagement
- Use media trending data to guide geographic and demographic targeting, particularly in higher-risk areas

Insights from recent market research continue to guide campaign strategy, supporting ongoing refinement of messaging, media selection, and audience targeting.

**Campaign Media and Implementation:**

The 2026 campaign will utilize a dynamic mix of media platforms and partnerships. Media investment levels and timing will be determined through detailed reach and frequency analysis, allowing for flexibility and real-time optimization as the season progresses.

Several external factors including major national events such as the World Cup and midterm elections are expected to influence media costs and availability. These conditions reinforce the need for careful planning, competitive negotiations, and continual monitoring of media performance.

As the media landscape continues to evolve, newer platforms such as Over-the-Top (OTT) and Connected TV (CTV), streaming radio, and podcasting require higher costs to achieve broad reach. While these platforms present challenges related to cost per point, they are increasingly necessary to reach key audiences. Through ongoing tracking and performance analysis, the District remains well positioned to negotiate effectively and allocate resources efficiently across media partners.

**Digital Media:**

Digital media will continue to play an expanded role in the 2026 campaign, particularly across social media, streaming, and digital news and entertainment platforms. Planned strategies include:

- Continued growth in social media advertising using both static and video formats to deliver timely, relevant, and shareable content
- Increased investment in OTT/CTV and streaming radio, reflecting audience shifts away from traditional broadcast platforms
- Potential use of podcast sponsorships where geographic targeting and cost efficiencies allow
- Expanded use of Nextdoor to target specific ZIP codes, with an emphasis on neighborhoods experiencing higher West Nile virus activity and invasive mosquito spread, particularly in Yolo County
- Targeted digital outreach to support invasive mosquito control initiatives, including community awareness efforts related to Sterile Insect Technique (SIT) releases in select areas

To support the expansion of our invasive mosquito control efforts, including the Sterile Insect Technique (SIT) in new areas, the District will use targeted digital outreach in select communities where sterile male mosquitoes are released. Similar to the digital campaign launched for the South Natomas pilot in 2025, this outreach will focus on providing clear, localized information to residents.

Outreach may include short video and display ads delivered through streaming television and radio platforms as well as mobile devices. Messaging will be targeted to specific neighborhoods within release areas to help explain the purpose of the program, what residents can expect, and how the effort supports long-term mosquito population reduction.

The digital media will continue to build awareness and support ongoing engagement throughout the mosquito season, while reinforcing transparency and public understanding as invasive mosquito control activities expand.

**Television:** *(Broadcast, Cable, and Digital)*

Television across broadcast, cable, and digital formats will continue to serve as a foundation of the advertising campaign by delivering strong visual and audio messaging.

- Increased use of digital and streaming television platforms will allow the District to reach cord-cutting audiences through OTT and CTV placements
- Commercials will be delivered through devices such as Apple TV, Roku, Amazon Fire, and Smart TVs via platforms including Prime, Max, Paramount, Peacock, Disney+, and others
- Ethnically targeted television will continue, with commercials produced in Spanish, Vietnamese, Hmong, Mandarin, and Russian
- Special television sponsorships, including live Sac-Yolo promotions during River Cats broadcasts, will be utilized again
- The District will continue actively pitching news stories and participating in live studio and informational segments to generate earned media coverage

**Radio:** *(Traditional and Streaming)*

Radio will remain an important component of the media mix and will include:

- Traditional radio advertising, sponsorships, interviews, and public service announcements
- Increased use of streaming radio to reach audiences through smart devices and digital platforms
- Negotiated bonus coverage to supplement scheduled flights
- Radio advertising in English, Spanish, and Russian
- Participation in radio public affairs programming to allow for more in-depth discussion of mosquito control topics

### **Campaign Timeline**

The campaign will launch during Mosquito Awareness Week in April as an early seasonal kickoff, supported largely through value-added placements provided by media partners.

- Initial paid placements will begin around Memorial Day
- The full campaign will launch in mid-June as weather conditions become more favorable for mosquito activity
- July, August, and September will serve as peak campaign months
- Messaging will continue through October, with an emphasis on invasive mosquitoes and fall activity
- Heavier messaging will align with key holidays such as the Fourth of July, National Night Out, and Labor Day

### **Campaign Value-added:**

As part of paid media negotiations, the District consistently secures significant value-added benefits, including:

- Bonus radio spots and sponsorships
- Free public service announcements and supplemental coverage
- Opportunities to participate in television and radio public affairs programming
- Distribution of District materials and repellent at media partner events and community appearances
- Earned media support through press releases and news coverage

### **Campaign Creative:**

In 2026, creative assets will be refreshed and developed as needed to support campaign goals and evolving outreach priorities. Creative may include a mix of digital, broadcast, and audio formats designed to reinforce key public health messages throughout the mosquito season.

Select creative assets may also highlight District milestones, including the District's 80th anniversary, providing an opportunity to emphasize the District's long-standing commitment to protecting public health while reinforcing mosquito prevention messaging.

### **Recommendation:**

**Approve the 2026 Advertising Plan not to exceed \$400,000.**

### 5. Board Review and Consideration of Installing Outdoor Surveillance Cameras and System

#### Staff Report:

The District facilities in both Elk Grove and Woodland have experienced incidents of vandalism and property damage in recent years. Staff investigated potential options to install an outdoor surveillance camera system to enhance security at both locations. Staff evaluated options including a vendor-managed surveillance system as well as a self-managed model in which the District would own the hardware and oversee system operations internally through the IT Department. Both systems would record and store images and videos when motion detected for a period of one year.

**Verkada:** Vendor managed system. 6 cameras (4 Elk Grove, 2 Woodland). Options of 5 or 10-year license and warranty, automatic updates to firmware and system updates performed through Verkada. Verkada offers a 5-year and a 10-year contract for their security system. Pricing includes professional installation.

\$38,000 one-time cost for 5 years of service

\$44,000 one-time cost for 10 years of service

**Ubiquiti:** Self-managed model system. 6 cameras (4 Elk Grove, 2 Woodland) 2-year warranty on hardware. Server and firmware updates would be responsibility of Districts IT department. District would be responsible for hiring outside contractors for installation.

\$18,500 for the equipment and \$9,000 for installation for a total approximately \$27,500.

Staff reached out to two Ubiquiti customers and was informed that after a year, the quality of the system began to fail. Failures with Ubiquiti would require the District to replace and install new cameras/hardware/etc. Potentially costing more staff time and additional/replacement purchases.

Verkada service program guarantees and replaces any equipment that is malfunctioning for the term of the contract.

#### Recommendation:

**Authorize the District to enter into a 10-year contract with Verkada**

### **6. Board Review and Consideration of Contract With MosquitoMate to Expand the District's Sterile Insect Technique Program**

#### **Staff Report:**

The District conducted an SIT program in the Natomas area last year hoping to evaluate SIT for both effectiveness and feasibility. The District's results showed promise as it relates to utilizing SIT as an effective tool for the future. The *aedes aegypti* population is continuing to grow in our area and staff would like to expand the program to supplement the traditional control efforts.

We have included a quote from MosquitoMate for an expansion of the program based on their capacity.

The project will run from July to October (similar to last year's program) and staff have identified various areas of the District where the releases would occur.

#### **Recommendation:**

**Authorize the Manager to engage in a contract with MosquitoMate for an expansion of the District's sterile insect technique program not to exceed \$140,000.**

#### **Staff Report:**

The District Board created an Ad Hoc Committee to negotiate a salary increase for the Manager. The terms were presented at the January meeting and direction was given to District Counsel to write an amendment to the Manager's contract.

#### **Recommendation:**

**Approve amendment #4 to the Manager's contract.**

## AMENDMENT NO. 4

### TO EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT BETWEEN SACRAMENTO-YOLO MOSQUITO AND VECTOR CONTROL DISTRICT AND GENERAL MANAGER

THIS AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT is made this 17<sup>th</sup> day of February 2026, by and between Sacramento-Yolo Mosquito and Vector Control District ("District") and Gary Goodman ("Manager"), who agree as follows:

1. Recitals. This Amendment is made with reference to the following background recitals:
  - 1.1. Effective January 1, 2014, the Parties entered into the Employment Agreement between Sacramento-Yolo Mosquito and Vector Control District and Manager (the "Agreement"), a copy of which is on file in the District office.
  - 1.2. The Parties negotiated an amendment to the Agreement ("Amendment No. 1") in July 2016.
  - 1.3. Under Amendment No. 1, the termination date of the Agreement was extended to December 31, 2022, and the Parties agreed that, prior to January 1, 2020, the Parties would negotiate and agree upon an appropriate salary adjustment for the remaining three years.
  - 1.4. Consistent with the terms of Amendment No. 1, the Parties negotiated a second amendment ("Amendment No. 2") in December 2019, the effects of which were to increase Manager's salary, effective January 1, 2020, to \$12,875, and to increase the District's deposit into Manager's tax-deferred account to a total of \$1,550 per month. The District's Board of Trustees approved these salary adjustments and adopted Amendment No. 2.
  - 1.5. In September 2022, the Parties negotiated a third amendment to the Agreement ("Amendment No. 3"), which extended the Agreement until December 31, 2028, and, effective January 1, 2023, increased Manager's salary to \$14,500 and increased the District's deposit into Manager's tax-deferred account to a total of \$2,300 per month. The District's Board of Trustees adopted Amendment No. 3.
  - 1.6. Under Amendment No. 3, the Parties agreed that, prior to January 1, 2026, the parties would negotiate and agree upon an appropriate salary adjustment for the remaining three years of the Agreement. Consistent with the terms of Amendment No. 3, the Parties have negotiated and agreed upon an appropriate salary adjustment for the remaining three years of the Agreement. The salary adjustment will be applied retroactively to January 1, 2026, and requires approval by the District Board of Trustees.
  - 1.7. Collectively, the Agreement, Amendment No. 1, Amendment No. 2, Amendment No. 3, and this Amendment No. 4 will be referred to hereafter as the "Agreement" and will constitute the entire understanding and agreement of the Parties.

IN CONSIDERATION of the mutual covenants contained herein and for good and valuable consideration, the Parties agree as follows:

2. Amendments to Agreement. The Agreement is hereby further amended as follows:
  - 2.1. Effective January 1, 2026, Employee's base salary will be increased to \$17,000 per month.
  - 2.2. Effective January 1, 2026, the District will increase its deposit into Employee's tax-deferred account to \$3,000 per month.
3. No Effect on Other Provisions. Except for the amendments set forth in section 2, all of the remaining provisions of the Agreement shall be unaffected and shall remain in full force and effect.
