Roll Call

This meeting was in person. Attendance was taken by roll call and a quorum was present.

Trustee Burnett moved to approve the General Consent Items and Trustee LaTorre seconded the motion. Voice vote was taken and the motion passed 12-0 with 1 member absent.

2. Opportunity for Public Comment

3. Reports to the Board

Manager's Report:

West Nile virus activity has increased across our District and the State since the July meeting. The District is responding with adult and larval mosquito control which seems to be suppressing the population. Delta breezes and shorter days are signaling a decline in mosquito and virus activity. Staff will continue to monitor and control activity as needed.

There are several ongoing construction projects at the District, including the laboratory vehicle storage building and the repair of the restrooms at the Woodland facility. The District is in the process of exploring prices for a new men's changing room, a new Board Room, the removal of the old storage tank, and a battery charging station.

Department Supervisors started the new 9/80 work schedule on August 1, 2026, and it seems to be going well.

District Departments:

Lab/Surveillance:

Mosquito surveillance indicates increasing West Nile virus (WNV) activity in both Sacramento and Yolo counties. To date, 3,170 mosquito pools have been tested, with 140 testing positive for WNV (85 Sacramento County and 55 Yolo County). Additionally, 250 dead birds have been tested, with 52 positive for WNV. We have received unconfirmed human cases of WNV and are waiting for them to be reported by CDPH. *Aedes aegypti* detections continue to expand and increase in urban areas of Sacramento and Yolo counties. Sterile Insect Technique (SIT) releases are underway in Rosemont, with WB-1 males being released across two 60-acre study areas to evaluate impacts on *Aedes aegypti* populations.

Ecological Management:

Ecological Management Supervisor Kevin Combo updated the Board on several key projects including the completed project at Saunders Ranch, where approximately 1,200 feet of pasture ditch were excavated, reducing an estimated seven acres of mosquito breeding habitat located near residential homes.

Staff continue working with local dairy producers to keep ditches and sumps free of vegetation, reducing larval harborage and improving the effectiveness of mosquito control treatments.

The Fall Flooding Program has begun with the annual notification letters being sent to all wetland owners.

Biological Control:

Ken Harris, Biological Control Supervisor, reported that the Fisheries Department remains busy with the 2026 rice stocking season. Although rice stocking began approximately one week later than last year, the department has stocked more than 2,900 pounds of mosquitofish across approximately 14,000 acres of rice. The Fisheries Department plans to continue rice stocking through the end of this week, and possibly into next week, depending on reports from the field.

Looking ahead, the department has begun drawing down several production ponds for annual cleaning. Following the rice season, fish from those ponds will be moved to netted ponds for overwintering, and indoor tanks will be restocked in preparation for fall flood-up operations expected to begin in late September or early October.

4. Board Review and Consideration of Resolution Authorizing the District to Update its Record Retention Policy.

Trustee Burnett moved to approve the proposed Resolution to update the record retention policy, and Trustee Hawkins seconded the motion. Voice vote was taken and the motion passed 12-0 with 1 member absent.

5. Board/Staff Reports and Requests/General Discussion.

The Manager reviewed the consideration of purchasing/leasing modular units for the men's changing room and the Board room. The District is considering a potential purchase and installation of an additional fuel tank. The Board agreed to cancel the November meeting last month. The Manager proposed rescheduling the October meeting to 10/27/2026, and the Board agreed.

6. ADJOURNMENT

The meeting adjourned at 10:32 a.m.

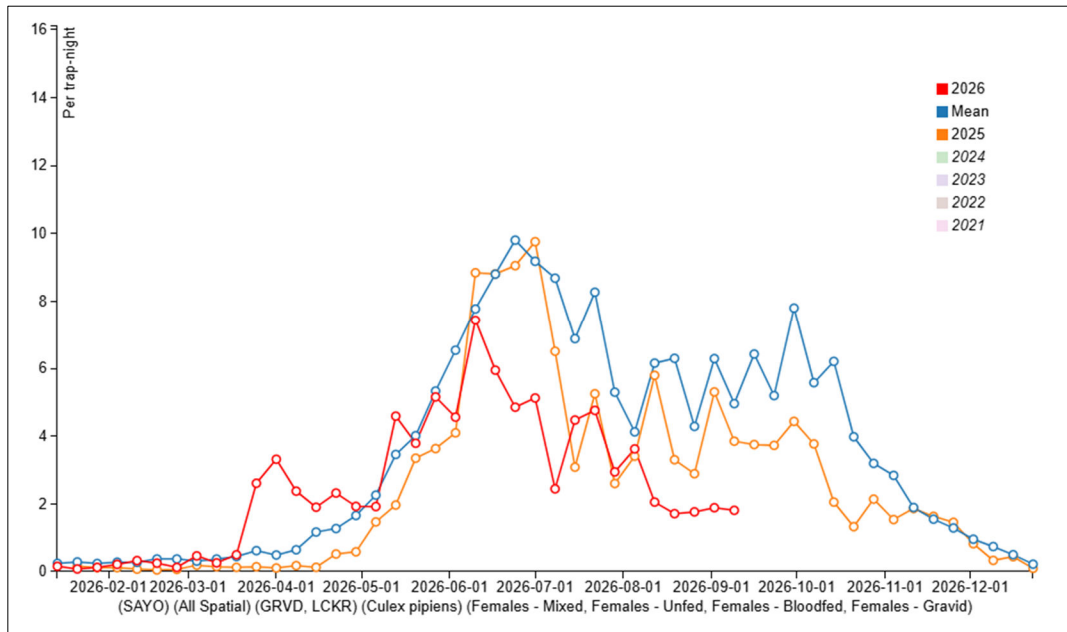

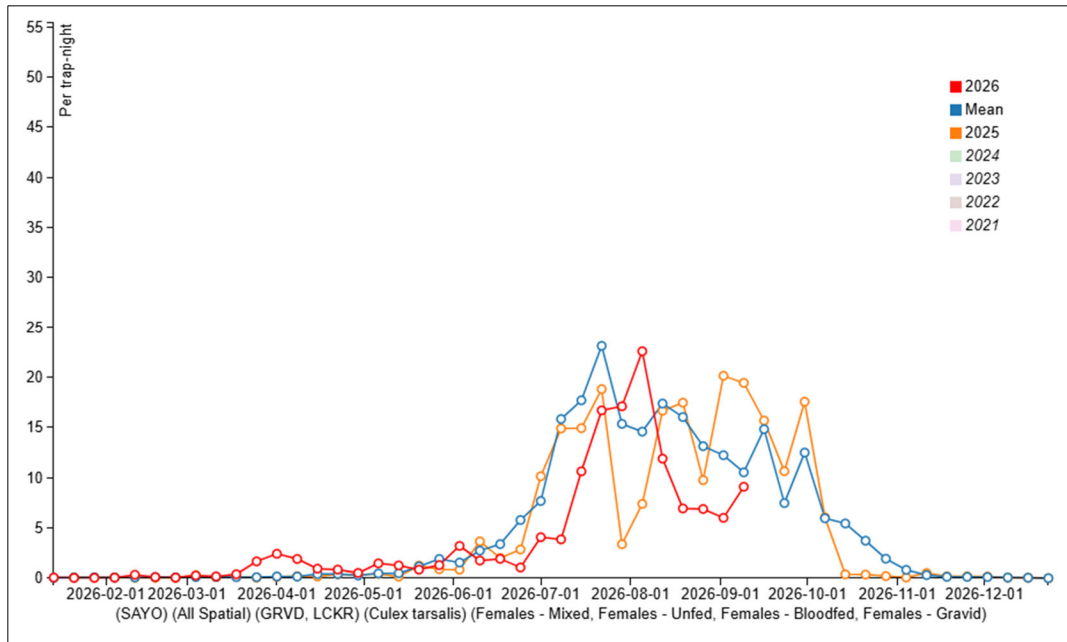

Surveillance update through 9/8/2026

Weekly mosquito collections – The following graphs show weekly abundance of *Culex tarsalis* and *Culex pipiens* collected in permanent gravid and locker trap locations throughout Sacramento and Yolo counties. These traps are operated year-round and provide a consistent measurement of seasonal mosquito abundance and long-term population trends.

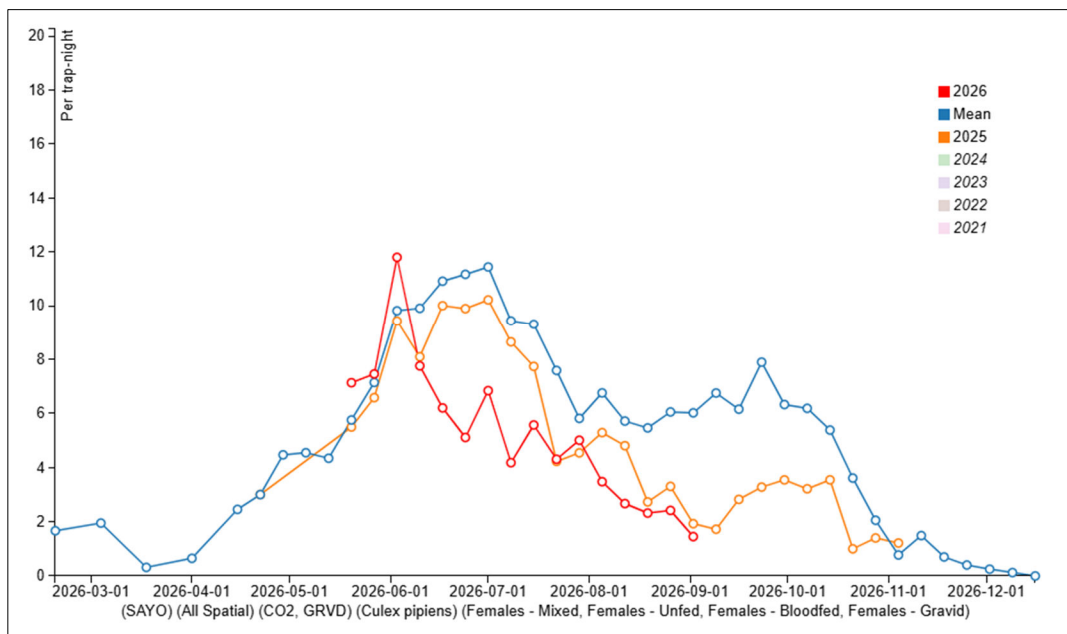


Culex pipiens abundance in constant operation locker and gravid traps.

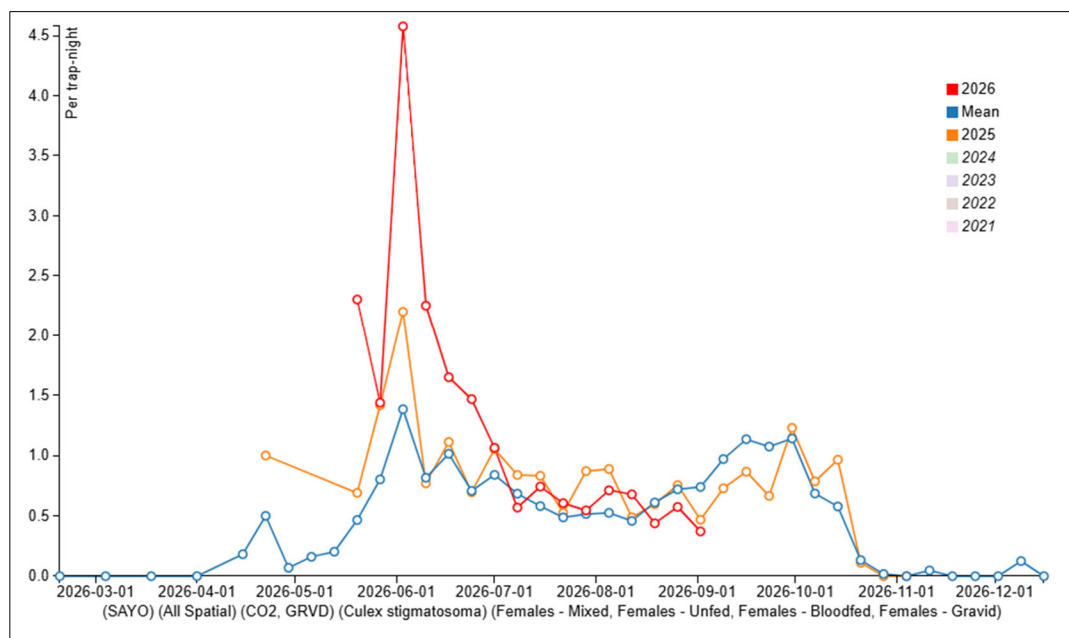


Culex tarsalis abundance in constant operation locker and gravid traps.

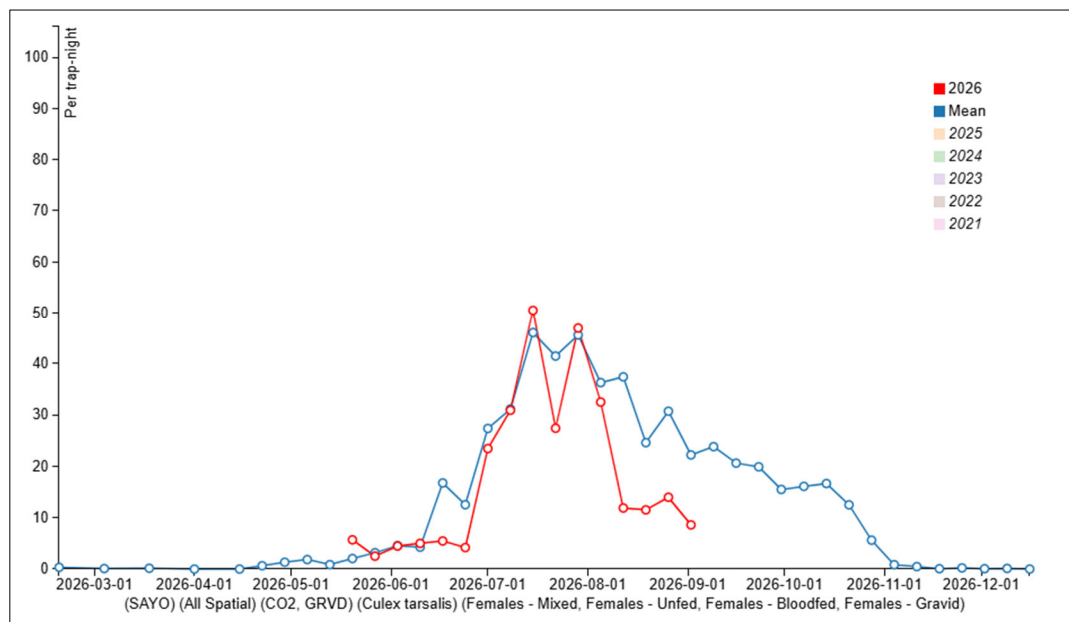
Encephalitis Vector Surveillance (EVS) – *Culex pipiens*, *Culex tarsalis*, and *Culex stigmatosoma* are collected throughout Sacramento and Yolo counties and tested for West Nile virus (WNV), St. Louis encephalitis virus (SLEV), and Western equine encephalitis virus (WEEV). To date, 5,228 mosquito pools were tested, including 3,581 from Sacramento County and 1,647 from Yolo County. In total 188 mosquito samples tested positive for WNV (Sacramento County: 108, Yolo County: 80). The figures below summarize EVS trap collections by species.



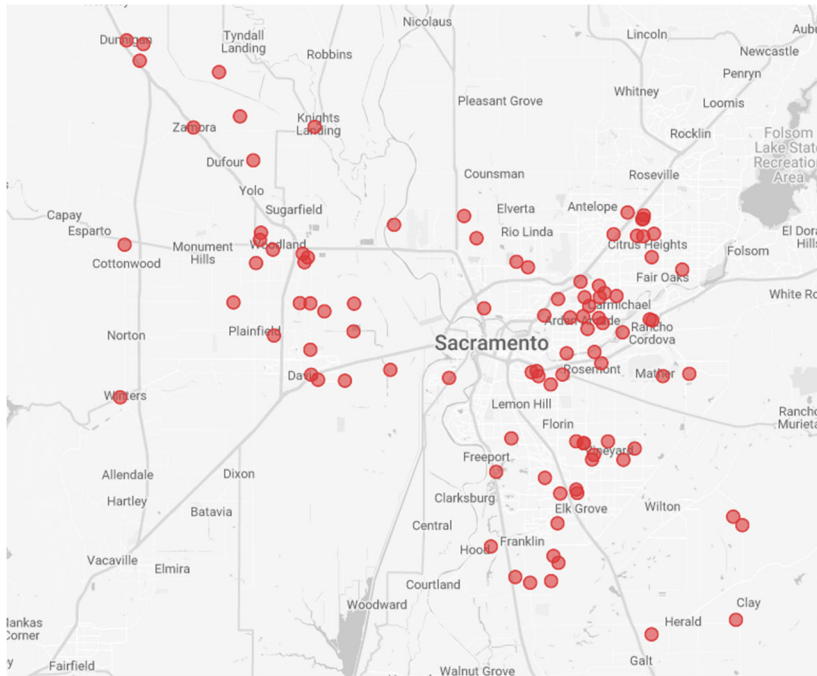
Culex pipiens collected in single-night CO2 and gravid traps



Culex stigmatosoma collected in single-night CO2 and gravid traps



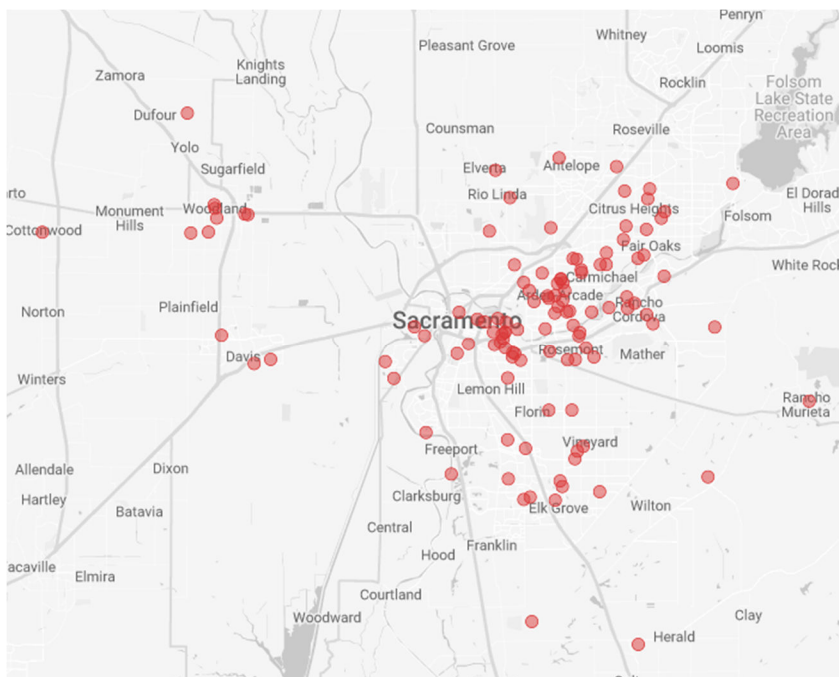

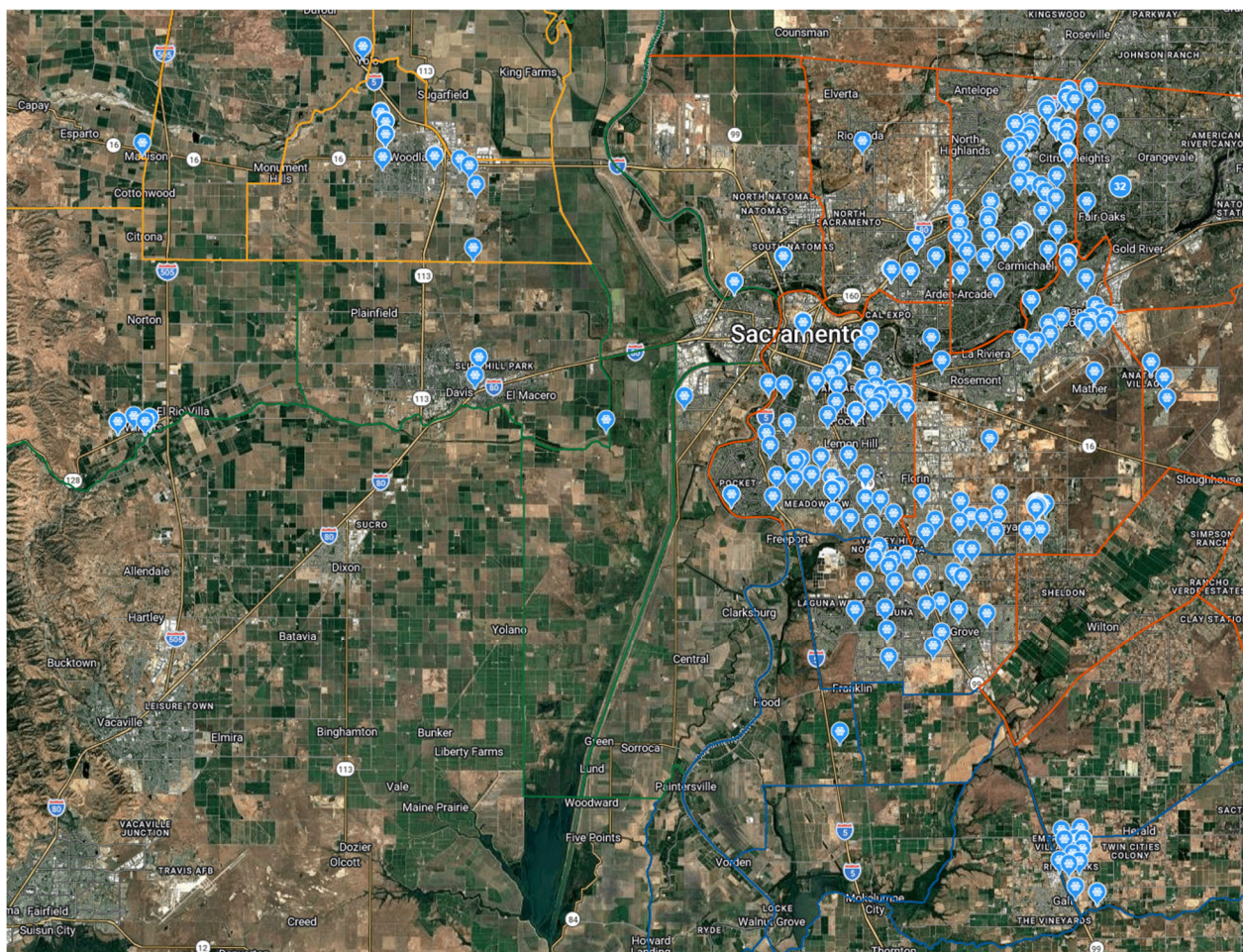

Rice surveillance – Counter traps are deployed in rice field agroecosystems (Winters, Natomas, Conaway, Yolo Bypass, and District 108) and are used to monitor mosquito abundance.

Human disease response surveillance – Since the last report, 1 travel-associated case of Dengue (Sacramento County), and 14 locally acquired human case of WNV (Sacramento County: 9, Yolo County: 6) were reported to the District, not all cases are confirmed, surveillance and control efforts are on-going.

Tick surveillance – Tick surveillance has concluded for the 2025-2026 season.

***Aedes aegypti* trapping effort in Sacramento and Yolo Counties:** Surveillance for the invasive mosquito *Aedes aegypti* is underway, with detections continuing to expand and increase in abundance across urban areas of Sacramento and Yolo counties. Sterile Insect Technique (SIT) releases in Rosemont began in early July and will continue through early October. WB-1 males are being released at a rate of 1,200 males per acre per week across two 60-acre study areas. A study is underway to evaluate the impact of these releases on *Aedes aegypti* populations within the release areas.

ECOLOGICAL MANAGEMENT DEPARTMENT

September 2026 Board Update

Ecological Management Projects-

Willie/Thorton/ Law Project (Elk Grove)

This project site is a significant spring and early-summer mosquito breeding area. Following winter and spring precipitation events, stormwater accumulates in low-lying areas across three separate parcels, creating approximately 4.40 acres of mosquito breeding habitat in close proximity to residential neighborhoods. The site generates multiple service requests from adjacent communities and provides highly suitable breeding habitat for several mosquito species, particularly *Culex spp.*, which are primary vectors of West Nile virus (WNV) in California. Persistent mosquito production in this area presents an ongoing public health concern by increasing the potential risk of mosquito-borne disease transmission to nearby residents.

To address this mosquito breeding source, the District's Ecological Management Department conducted a comprehensive elevation survey of the site. Survey results confirmed sufficient topographic fall to support the construction of a new drainage ditch along the northern edge of the properties. Ecological Management staff subsequently excavated approximately 1250 linear feet of drainage ditch to provide a sustainable drainage solution. The project will improve stormwater conveyance, reduce standing water, and minimize mosquito breeding opportunities while supporting the District's continued commitment to public health protection through proactive source reduction and best management practices.

Yolo Bypass Wildlife Area (Yolo County)

Ecological Management staff, in coordination with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife, completed setback activities on multiple wetlands in close proximity to West Sacramento prior to seasonal flooding. Ecological Management technicians disked the wetlands to reduce stands of joint grass (*Paspalum distichum* L.), which can provide favorable habitat for immature mosquitoes in seasonal freshwater wetlands. This vegetation management effort is expected to reduce mosquito abundance and distribution by eliminating potential larval harborage areas. Disking also disrupts dormant *Aedes* mosquito eggs present in the wetland soils by burying them deeper into the soil profile, further reducing the potential for successful hatching following subsequent flood up events.

Wetland Program

District staff recently attended a partnership meeting with Yolo Bypass Wildlife Area managers, the Yolo County Resource Conservation District (RCD), and local duck club representatives to coordinate water deliveries and essential fall flood-up activities in preparation for the 2026 waterfowl hunting season. Prior to the meeting, District staff distributed the annual Fall Flooding Program guidelines to participating property owners and wetland managers, resulting in the submission of detailed flooding plans identifying wetland acreages scheduled for early flooding. Ecological Management staff are currently developing individualized mosquito management and treatment plans for each participating club in coordination with the Program Manager. Based on projections supplied by refuge managers and private duck club owners, a total of 2856 acres are anticipated to be flooded early to provide habitat and attract waterfowl as the migration season begins.

BIOLOGICAL CONTROL

Monthly Report for September 2026 Board Meeting

In August, the Fisheries Department completed the 2026 rice-field stocking program, with the final stocking taking place on August 19. During the season, fisheries technicians stocked 3,024 pounds of mosquitofish across 203 rice fields, covering 14,636 acres. Rice fields were stocked in the district's Natomas, Yolo Bypass, Conaway, Winters, Tyler Island, and Cosumnes River Preserve areas.

With the rice season complete, the department has shifted its focus toward the fall flooding of wetlands and duck clubs. We are working closely with the Ecological Management Department and field staff, who communicate regularly with landowners to help identify anticipated flood-up dates. Most wetlands are expected to become available for fish plants from late September through October.

Pond rehabilitation also began during August, with five production ponds being drained in preparation for cleaning. As fish are recovered, a portion is transferred into the indoor tanks to support upcoming fall stocking requests, while the remainder is moved into the netted ponds for overwintering. Once the drained ponds have dried, accumulated sediment will be removed using a tractor and dump truck. The ponds will then be fertilized, refilled, and restocked for the following production season.

The Sacramento perch project also continued during August. California Department of Fish and Wildlife staff, working alongside District Fisheries staff, seined approximately 3,000 Sacramento perch from two ponds. The fish were transferred to a pond at Elk Grove Park to support future recreational fishing opportunities.

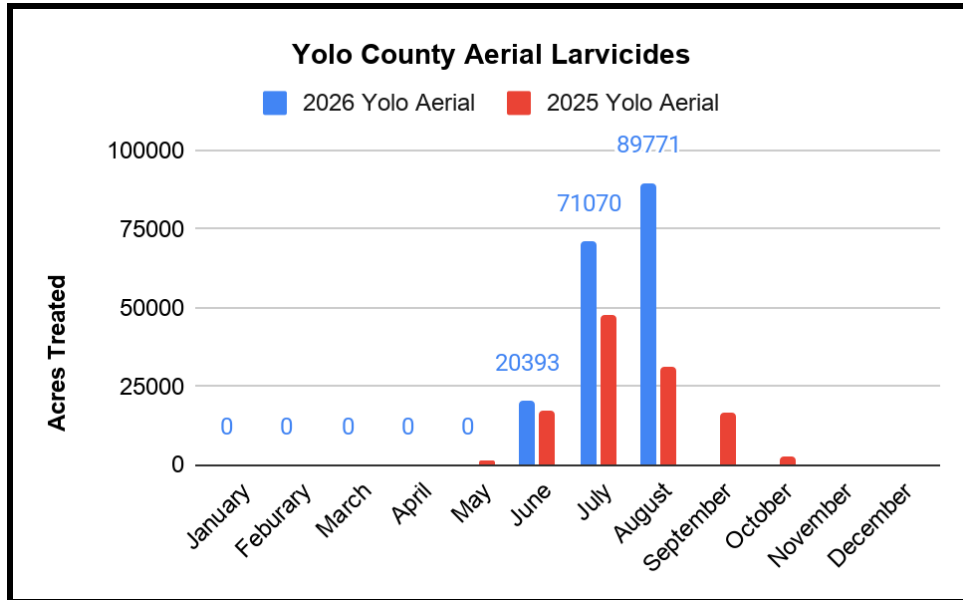
West Nile Virus (WNV), Urban, Aedes and General Mosquito Control

One hundred thirty eight ground based ULV applications were conducted in the month of August with 43 of those applications in response to West Nile virus positive mosquito samples. Control Operations will continue to respond with localized ground based applications in response to high trap counts and or West Nile positive mosquito samples.

Larval applications and adult treatments continue to be made based upon routine inspections and local service requests in both counties. Service requests remain elevated due to day biting mosquito activity.

During the month of August, Vector Control Disease International (VDCI) conducted 33 aerial adulticide applications over rural agricultural areas to reduce adult mosquito populations. Weekly aerial treatments will continue as needed, based on adult mosquito abundance and the detection of West Nile virus-positive mosquito samples.





Rice Program

The District has been larviciding over rice growing areas on a scheduled weekly basis with an increase in applications surrounding West Nile virus positive areas. Adulticide applications have also been conducted in rural areas in response to both high trap counts as well as West Nile virus positive mosquitoes.

UAS (Drone) Larvicide Operations

The District's UAS contractor conducted one larvicide application in the month of August. The District will continue to utilize local contractors on an as needed basis for the remainder of the season.

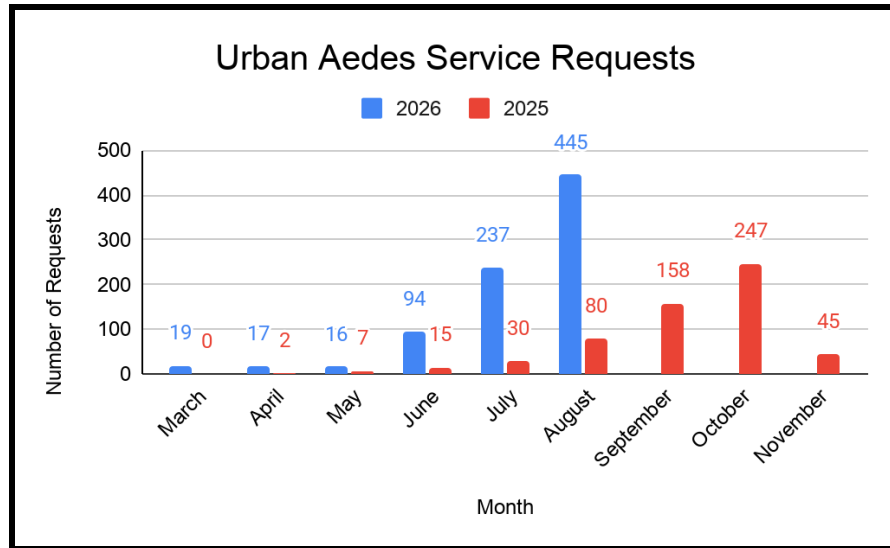


Yellow Jacket Control

Both Sacramento Control crews continue to monitor and re-bait yellow jacket traps in known areas while responding to new service requests.

Urban Control Operations: Invasive Aedes Control Program

The Department conducted 931 site visits, and completed 172 unique inspections resulting in 64 larval detections. Staff responded to 445 specific service requests related to urban day-biting mosquito activity. In addition to individual backyard treatments, staff also conducted 7 early morning WALs applications. The Department will continue to respond to requests while actively monitoring known detection areas.



Catch Basin Program

The Catch Basin Program has treated 82,834 and Inspected 119,690 basins to date. In 2025 a total of 55,549 were treated at this time. Additional basins have been treated around West Nile virus positive locations in addition to normal treatment areas. Product selection will continue to be rotated throughout the season.

Monthly Report for the September 2026 Board Meeting

Community Outreach Events:

September is shaping up to be one of our busiest outreach months, with the District scheduled to participate in 11 community events throughout Sacramento and Yolo counties. While summer is coming to an end, mosquito season is far from over. West Nile virus activity can continue well into the fall, and invasive *Aedes* mosquitoes remain active, making these events valuable opportunities to remind residents to continue taking precautions against mosquito bites.

As part of our new partnership with Sacramento Republic FC, the District will have a presence at upcoming games, allowing us to connect with families and soccer fans while promoting mosquito prevention and distributing free repellent. Staff will also participate in community events in Rosemont as part of our ongoing Sterile Insect Technique (SIT) project, providing opportunities to speak directly with residents about invasive mosquitoes, answer questions, and share updates about the program.

Other September events include Mexican Independence Day at the State Capitol, which attracts more than 5,000 attendees. Since this popular celebration takes place in the evening, our free repellent packets are especially useful and appreciated. We will also attend the Carnitas Festival in Winters, where staff will speak with residents about the invasive mosquito infestation throughout the city, as well as the Fair Oaks Chicken Festival. Together, these events allow us to reach diverse communities across the District and reinforce that mosquito prevention remains important even as the summer season winds down.

Media Coverage:

Recent increases in West Nile virus activity and confirmed human cases in both Sacramento and Yolo counties have generated significant media interest. The District participated in coverage with CBS13 and an in-depth segment on Capital Public Radio's *Insight*, providing updates on current virus activity and reinforcing important prevention messages. Staff was also invited to participate in a FOX40 meteorology segment focused specifically on the connection between weather, mosquito populations, and West Nile virus activity. These opportunities continue to position the District as a trusted local resource while helping residents understand their risk and the importance of protecting themselves from mosquito bites.

Social media

Our social media efforts continue, with current messaging focused on West Nile virus activity throughout the District, invasive mosquitoes, spray notifications, repellent use, District services, and general mosquito prevention.

This year, our seasonal staff has played an instrumental role in expanding and refreshing our social media content. She has worked with staff across various departments to gather photos and

videos that showcase the wide range of work taking place throughout the District. This has allowed us to create more engaging, behind-the-scenes content that puts a face to the District and gives residents a better understanding of the people and services behind our public health mission.

Our content has also expanded to include fun, timely reels that incorporate current social media trends, along with “Day in the Life” features and videos highlighting different positions and departments. This more personal and engaging approach has been very well received and has helped attract many new followers to our Instagram account while increasing awareness of the District and the important work our employees do every day.

Advertising Campaign

The District’s advertising campaign continues to maintain a strong presence throughout the region, with *Fight the Bite* messaging running across television, radio, outdoor billboards, and a variety of digital platforms. Current advertising focuses on the importance of using mosquito repellent, promoting the many services available to residents, and increasing awareness of invasive *Aedes* mosquitoes as they continue to spread throughout the District.

The combination of traditional and digital advertising allows us to reach residents across multiple platforms and reinforce important mosquito prevention messages throughout the season. The campaign will remain active through the end of October, helping remind residents that mosquito activity and the risk of disease can continue into the fall.

Repellent Distribution

Repellent distribution continues throughout the District, with field technicians providing free mosquito repellent wipes and educational materials during service requests. Recently, repellent was also provided to Mercy Peddlers and Dandelion Seeds, two community organizations that provide food, water, survival supplies, and other essential resources to unhoused individuals in South Sacramento.

We have also seen a noticeable increase in repellent requests from residents in response to our advertising and social media efforts promoting free repellent wipes as a District service. The strong response demonstrates continued public interest in personal protection and provides another opportunity to reinforce the importance of wearing repellent to prevent mosquito bites.

4. Status of West Nile Virus Activity and District Response

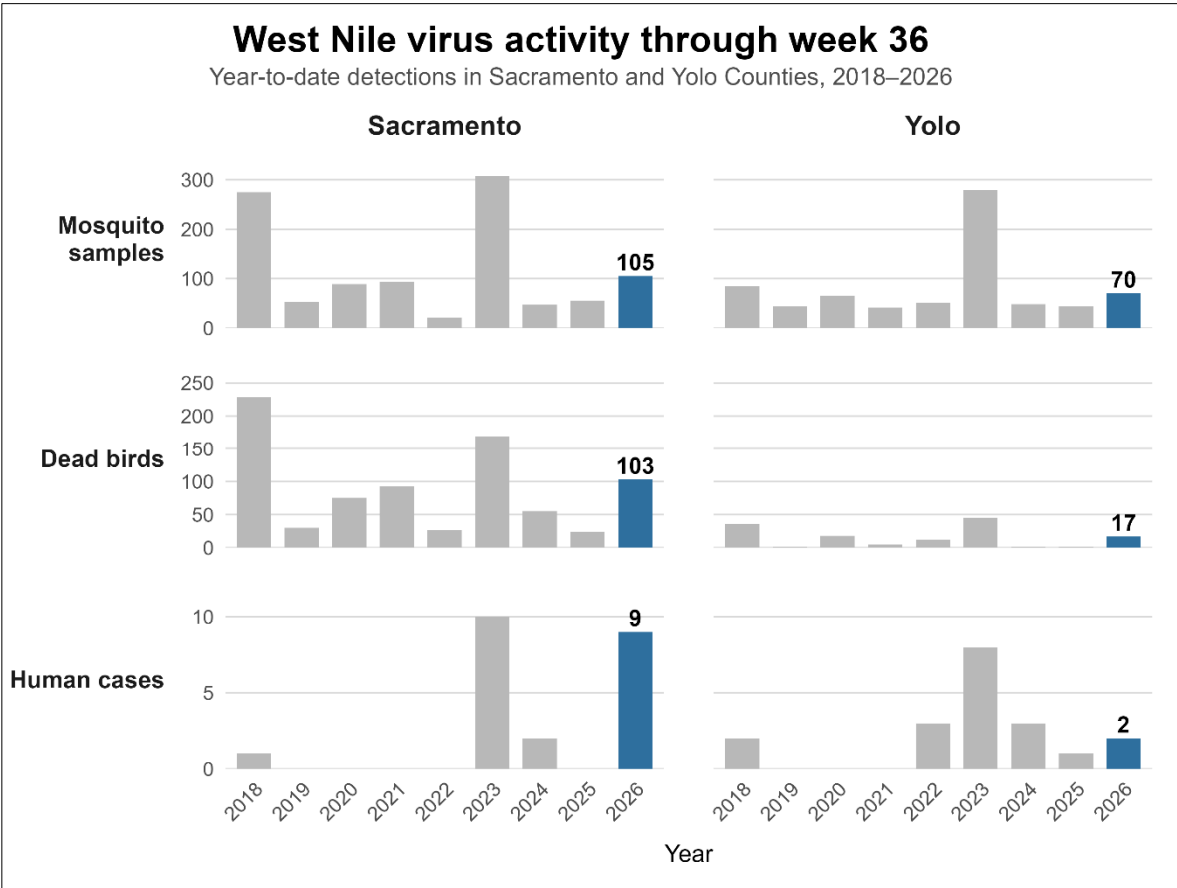
Staff Report:

Staff continue to follow the Mosquito and Mosquito-Borne Disease Management Plan, which outlines response measures for elevated mosquito abundance and WNV activity. When a WNV-positive mosquito or dead bird is detected, laboratory personnel increase surveillance around the detection site to assess the extent of local activity. Control personnel evaluate and treat larval and adult mosquito sources as appropriate to reduce mosquito populations and transmission risk. The area is monitored following treatment, with additional control measures considered if WNV activity persists.

The District has experienced higher WNV activity in 2026 compared with 2024 and 2025 and continues to respond with ground-based adulticide treatments in urban and suburban areas as indicated by surveillance metrics. The District has maintained its aerial adulticide program over rice growing and agricultural areas to reduce populations and to prevent migration from these areas to the population centers of the District. The number of aerial treatments in rural areas has increased in 2026 compared to 2025 despite a similar number in planted rice acres (42,299 for 2026 compared to 43,561 in 2025). No urban aerial adulticide treatments have been scheduled this year.

Statewide, WNV activity is higher than in 2024 and 2025 but similar to levels observed in 2023. In Sacramento and Yolo Counties, WNV activity is also elevated compared with the previous two years but remains below the outbreak levels observed in 2018 and 2023. Through week 36, both counties have recorded their third-highest number of WNV-positive mosquito samples since 2018. Sacramento County has also experienced a substantial increase in WNV-positive dead birds and has reported nine human cases, compared with no cases in 2025 and two in 2024. The figures below compare WNV activity in Sacramento and Yolo Counties through week 36 from 2018 through 2026.

5. Board Review and Consideration to Remove Unused Above Ground Storage Tank

Staff Report:

The District has received bids for the removal and disposal of the obsolete pesticide tank located at the Bond Road Facility. The tank has been empty and out of service since 2012 and is no longer suitable for the type of pesticide currently used by the District. The scope of work includes removing the existing tank and all associated parts, hauling and properly disposing of all materials and debris, and grading and leveling the area upon completion. The site will be left in a clean, safe, and serviceable condition. The quotes include the provision of prevailing wage. A summary of the attached quotes are below. The Jim Thorpe Inc. quote is the only one that included the permit costs which we estimate to be about \$2,000 or more.

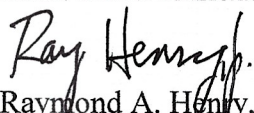
