#### 3. Reports to the Board

#### Manager's Report:

The Manager discussed the state of West Nile virus activity and the new findings of Saint Louis Encephalitis in the mosquito population outside of Woodland. He also highlighted the increase in Anopheles mosquitoes as the rice begins to drain and harvest. He discussed the CaIPERS valuations that were recently released and indicated that the return from our portfolio was less than CaIPERS predicted and that our rates for FY 24-25 will increase. The audit is scheduled to begin in December due to the availability of our auditor.

#### Lab/Surveillance:

Lab Director Sarah Wheeler updated the board that the abundance of Culex tarsalis in Sacramento and Yolo counties has decreased to levels similar to the five-year mean. West Nile virus continues in both counties. Thus far, 6,599 pools of Culex tarsalis and Culex pipiens were collected and tested for West Nile (WNV), Saint Louis encephalitis (SLEV), and western equine encephalitis viruses (WEEV). As of 9/8/2023 there were 323 and 281 WNV-positive pools collected in Sacramento and Yolo Counties, respectively. Additionally, there were two pools of Culex tarsalis that tested positive for

SLEV. Thus far in 2023, 508 dead birds were collected and tested for WNV, SLEEV, and WEEV; 219 tested positive for WNV (Sacramento County-172; Yolo County-47). Sentinel chickens at Isleton, Knights Landing, and Dunnigan flocks have tested positive for WNV antibodies. Invasive Aedes surveillance for 2023 has found both Aedes aegypti (Carmichael, Elk Grove, Rancho Cordova, Sacramento, West Sacramento, and Winters) and Aedes albopictus (Carmichael and Sacramento). Surveillance for these invasive species is ongoing.

#### **Ecological Management:**

Ecological Management Department (ECO) supervisor Kevin Combo informed the Board on progress of two Best Management Practices (BMP) projects at Serra Wetlands (Elk Grove) and Cache Creek (Yolo County). Kevin explained that the Serra Project drained about 40-50 acres of wetland habitat that was flooded up due to beaver (Castor canadensis) activity. The Cache Creek basin vegetation control project allowed Control Operations technicians access and the ability to apply liquid larvicide in lieu of using residual granular products. Kevin gave a summary of the recent Yolo Basin Wildlife Area (YBWA) Fall Flooding meeting that discussed the proposed wetland flooding timelines and acreages. Kevin updated the Board on the current status of the Planning/Environmental Program. Ecological Management staff are focusing their efforts on some of the larger projects (The New Zoo, Bird Returns Program, Staten Island Wetland Project) that may affect mosquito control activities if not addressed in the preliminary planning stages of the projects.

#### **Biological Control:**

Ken Harris submitted a written report.

#### Larval and Adult Control:

Program Coordinator Marty Scholl reported the status of rice being grown in Yolo and Sacramento County. Marty provided an update on the fall flooding program treatments being performed by UAV and Farm Air flying services. Marty gave an update on the continued aerial adulticide treatments for both counties. Invasive aedes detections have been made in the areas of Rosemont, South Natomas, Winters, Land Park, Carmichael and recently in West Sacramento as well as the community of Anatolia. Aedes focused treatments are being performed in and around these areas.

#### Public Outreach:

During the Public Information and Outreach update Luz talked about the various news stories and media coverage obtained recently specifically about the recent WNV deaths and increase in cases. She also talked about the various events we will be part of in September, the advertising campaign which will continue thru October, keeping local elected officials informed of all of our District activities and a presentation to the Elk Grove Rotary Club.

#### 4. Board Review and Consideration of New Accounting Software

Staff introduced the item highlighting the District's need to update our new accounting software to Quickbooks. The Board discussed the item and a motion was made by Trustee Denny and seconded by Trustee Karpinski-Costa to accept the staff's recommendation. The vote was taken by roll call and the motion passed by the following vote: Ayes: 12, Noes: 0, Absent: 1.

#### 5. Board/Staff Reports and Requests / General Discussion

The Manager discussed the upcoming MVCAC meeting in January. He also highlighted the District's upcoming meeting with the City of Davis on better communication strategies when future aerial applications are needed. The Manager reminded the Board that the November meeting will be held on November 14<sup>th</sup>.

#### 6. ADJOURNMENT

The meeting adjourned at 11:04 a.m.

This agreement may be canceled for cause by either party by giving 30 days advance notice in writing, setting forth the reasons for the termination.

#### Part I. Pesticides

The vector control agency named herein agrees:

- 1. To calibrate all application equipment using acceptable techniques before using, and to maintain calibration records for review by the County Agricultural Commissioner.
- 2. To seek the assistance of the County Agricultural Commissioner in the interpretation of pesticide labeling.
- 3. To maintain for at least two years for review by the County Agricultural Commissioner a record of each pesticide application showing the target vector, the specific location treated, the size of the source, the formulations and amount of pesticide used, the method and equipment used, the type of habitat treated, the date of the application, and the name of the applicator(s).
- 4. To submit to the County Agricultural Commissioner each month a Pesticide Use Report, on Department of Pesticide Regulation form PR-ENF-060. The report shall include the manufacturer and product name, the EPA registration number from the label, the amount of each pesticide used, the number of applications of each pesticide, and the total number of applications, per county, per month.
- To report to the County Agricultural Commissioner and the California Department of Public Health, in a manner specified, any 5. conspicuous or suspected adverse effects upon humans, domestic animals and other non-target organisms, or property from pesticide applications.
- To require appropriate certification of its employees by the California Department of Public Health in order to verify their 6. competence in using pesticides to control pest and vector organisms, and to maintain continuing education unit information for those employees participating in continuing education.
- 7. To be inspected by the County Agricultural Commissioner on a regular basis to ensure that local agency activities are in compliance with state laws and regulations relating to pesticide use.

#### Part II. Environmental Modification

To comply with requirements, as specified, of any general permit issued to the California Department of Public Health as the lead agency, pertaining to physical environmental modification to achieve pest and vector prevention.

# a. Manager's Report

The District's West Nile season is almost over. We typically only see a few positives throughout October and then will cease testing operations over the winter. Staff is following the Mosquito Borne Disease Management Plan to help respond to the remaining positive locations when the weather allows.

We are continuing to address the invasive species detections. All of our detections are being handled with increased surveillance, door to door inspections, and both larvicide and adulticide treatments where feasible. We anticipate that the behavior of the *Aedes aegypti* mosquito will slow down significantly as the weather cools.

Staff is working on a front office remodel with new work spaces and a better use of the footprint in the administration building.

The District is working with our benefit broker, Alliant, on open enrollment healthcare rates.





**Weekly mosquito collections** – The following graphs show overall *Culex tarsalis* and *Culex pipiens* abundance from gravid traps and locker traps placed in permanent locations throughout Sacramento and Yolo Counties.




Weekly Culex tarsalis abundance traps in locker and gravid traps.




Weekly Culex pipiens abundance traps in locker and gravid traps.

**Encephalitis Vector Surveillance (EVS)** – The following graphs show the number of *Culex tarsalis* and *Culex pipiens* that were collected in CO<sub>2</sub>-baited EVS traps that were set in established and response locations throughout Sacramento and Yolo Counties. *Culex tarsalis* and *Culex pipiens* were tested for West Nile (WNV), western equine encephalitis (WEEV), and Saint Louis encephalitis viruses (SLEV).




Female Culex tarsalis collected in EVS traps




Female Culex pipiens collected in EVS traps

**Mosquito-borne virus testing** – Thus far 7,571 pools of *Culex tarsalis* and *Culex pipiens* were tested for WNV, WEEV, and SLEV. Of the tested pools there were 340 and 292 WNV-positive pools collected in Sacramento and Yolo Counties, respectively. Additionally, 3 pools of *Culex tarsalis* from Yolo County were positive for SLEV.

**Dead birds** – To date, 564 dead birds were collected and tested for WNV, SLEEV, and WEEV. Overall, 251 birds tested positive for WNV (Sacramento County: 190, Yolo County: 61).

**Sentinel chickens** – Sentinel chickens were deployed to five sites in Sacramento (Isleton, Sacramento, and Rancho Murietta) and Yolo (Dunnigan and Knight's Landing) counties. Testing results are below.

**Rice Surveillance** – Rice field Counter traps were deployed to Conaway, Vic Fazio, Winters, Natomas, and District 108 rice fields. These traps provide real-time mosquito abundance data, allowing for remote monitoring of rice field mosquito populations. Most rice fields are now in the process of draining. Couter traps will be collected for the season by the end of October.

**Human disease response surveillance** –As of 10/6/2023 there were 19 confirmed human cases of WNV in Sacramento County, and 16 cases in Yolo County. Since the last report there was also a single human case of chikungunya reported in Sacramento County.

**Tick surveillance** – Tick surveillance is complete for the spring 2023 season and will resume in November 2023.

Aedes aegypti trapping effort in Sacramento and Yolo Counties – Surveillance for Aedes aegypti and Aedes albopictus continues, the program is focused both on monitoring known populations and identifying emerging areas of activity. Both species are active in Sacramento County. The following table shows the cumulative 2023 trapping effort and detections of Aedes aegypti and Aedes albopictus in Sacramento and Yolo Counties. During September Aedes aegypti was detected in two new areas, Rancho Murieta and Sloughhouse. Surveillance for these two invasive species will continue through October.




## ECOLOGICAL MANAGEMENT DEPARTMENT

## **October 2023 Board Update**

## Overview

Ecological Management staff in coordination with Ryan Wagner developed a new desktop feature that will allow staff to see the status of the Fall Flooding Program. This program will illustrate which entities are flooding up particular ponds, the acreage of the ponds, estimated material to be used and the projected cost of the treatment. This program will also display the potential cost sharing for those wetland managers that flood their fields early so that information can be conveyed to them prior to flooding. This will be a valuable tool in making treatment plans when future Fall Flooding schedules are submitted to the District.





In September/October, Ecological Management staff supplemented the Control Operations Department in Zone 42 and Fisheries staff with pond cleaning projects as both Depts. are presently short of staff.

# **Ecological Management Projects**

## Pirates's Lair Marina (South Sacramento County)

Pirate's Lair Marina is located in south Sacramento County along the Mokelumne River. The marina is also a 50 parcel small residential community adjacent to a 15 acre organic property. Every mosquito season residents of the marina submit multiple Service Requests for adult mosquito populations. It was discovered that behind the marina several overgrown ditches were found to be breeding sites for *Aedes* and *Culex* species of mosquitoes. Staff utilized the track loader and the backhoe to expose and remove emergent vegetation from 2841' of drain ditches. This will allow access for Control Operations staff to effectively treat the drain ditches and reduce the mosquito populations in the area, in turn reducing the number of Service Requests submitted by patrons and residents of the marina.



# Laguna Del Sol (Wilton)

Laguna Del Sol is an RV resort located in the rural town of Wilton. Next to the resort is a series of low areas that is the natural drainage for stormwater effluent. In the spring, the low areas are full of winter stormwater and begin to start breeding immature larvae. The dense vegetation coupled with deadfall and debris make the area hazardous and difficult for Control Operations staff to safely conduct surveillance and treatments. Ecological Management staff in cooperation

with Laguna Del Sol maintenance personnel used the track loader to remove the deadfall and vegetation giving Control Operations staff safe access to conduct mosquito control activities.



### **Agricultural Program**

October typically signifies the end of the summer growing season. In the fall, the majority of the crops that are prevalent in Sacramento and Yolo Counties such as corn, rice, and tomatoes are being harvested. With low nighttime temperatures, farmers that typically irrigate pastures, alfalfa and clover have all but stopped irrigations as the crops are not growing with the mild temperatures. Historically, this time of year, staff notice an increase in the abundance of *Culex pipien* mosquito populations in and around dairies as the mosquitoes are making their last push for a blood meal before entering diapause. Ecological Management staff continue to coordinate with local dairy farmers on implementing Mosquito Reducing Best Management Practices to reduce mosquito populations and make chemical control more efficient and effective.



## Cemeteries

Staff have completed all inspections and treatments of cemeteries within the District. In September/October, staff focused their efforts around recent West Nile Virus (WNV) activity in the cemeteries located in Woodland and Davis, Yolo County. To date, staff have treated approximately 18,741 cemetery vases in 21 different cemeteries. Staff continue to monitor the cemetery vase trial. The goal of the trial is to observe the efficacy of Sumilarv .05g (Pyriproxifen) in cemetery vases. Initial results indicate that approximately 8 weeks of control with about 98% mortality has been observed. Staff will continue to monitor to see at what length of time it starts to notice failure in the product.

## BIOLOGICAL CONTROL Monthly Report for October 2023 Board Meeting

In September, the Fisheries Department provided 13.9 pounds of mosquitofish for use by field technicians. To date, we've distributed a total of 2,583 pounds of mosquitofish, covering 13,098 acres. These numbers are consistent with previous years and are expected to increase as we approach the fall flood-up season. We anticipate that a majority of duck clubs and wetlands will become available for fish planting early in October. However, this is contingent upon the environment and water quality, factors that our field personnel monitor on a regular basis. Our department continued with our pond cleaning and maintenance schedule. Currently, one pond has been completed and is in the process of being refilled and restocked with mosquitofish. We have plans to complete two more ponds in the month of October. Furthermore, our fisheries technicians worked with Urban Operations, assisting with invasive Aedes trapping, inspections, and treatments. Daily activities such as water quality testing and tank cleaning were continued to maintain high-quality fish. The Fisheries Department also collaborated closely with the shop to ensure all our equipment and small engines were maintained and serviced according to schedule.

## CONTROL OPERATIONS Monthly Report for October 2023 Board Meeting

## Culex and West Nile Virus (WNV) Control

While the weather has started to turn cooler, Control Operations continue to respond to West Nile virus positive locations, service requests, and known breeding sites with appropriate control methods. The rice growing season has come to an abrupt halt over the last few weeks, with most rice fields being drained by mid September, giving way to the start of Fall Flooding. Field Technicians have been looking at flooded habitat fields and have scheduled aerial treatments as appropriate.

## **Aerial Applications**

The District continues to perform aerial adulticide applications over rice growing and wetland habitats areas of both Sacramento and Yolo Counties on an as needed basis. The cooler temperatures coupled with most rice fields being drained has begun to diminish aerial application frequencies as the mosquito season begins to wind down.

Seasonally fall flooded wetlands, recreational habitats, and remaining flooded rice fields have been and will continue to be treated with larvicides by the District contractors, using UAS and conventional aircraft.

### Yellow Jacket Control

Sacramento Control Operations have been treating high population areas of yellow jackets around residential homes and trails with around two hundred nests treated this fall to date.



#### **Invasive Aedes Control**


Invasive Aedes continue to be found as the season progresses. One new detection area was found in Rancho Murieta and an additional previously known location but new for this season in Rio Linda. Staff perform backyard adult and larval control where detections are found. Wide Area Larviciding (WALS) treatments will continue to be performed in areas in the early morning hours where adult trap populations continue to rise until overnight temperatures prevent adult emergence or they are no longer detected.

### **Field Trials**

One last efficacy trial was conducted at the end of September to quantify the effectiveness of the District's most commonly used ground based ULV adulticides. UAS units were utilized for trial design, documentation, and wind speed verification.

#### PUBLIC INFORMATION AND EDUCATION Monthly Report for the October 2023 Board Meeting

#### **Events:**

October has become a very busy month for events especially this year with the intense West Nile virus season and ongoing detections of invasive Aedes. Events will continue until the end of the month when the season traditionally ends and the weather cools down significantly. One of the largest events we have attended this month is the Giant Pumkin Festival in Elk Grove. This is a very popular community event that draws huge crowds and is one of our most successful events. Recently we also attended the 14<sup>th</sup> Annual Rosemont Community Celebration which was very diverse and many people stopped by the booth to ask about invasive mosquitoes and the mosquito control work in their neighborhood. We were glad to be there to answer questions and encourage signing up for email notifications. In response to the intense WNV this season and questions from Davis residents and local elected officials, we will be hosting a table at an upcoming Farmers Market in partnership with the city.

#### **October events:**

#### Advertising Campaign

The advertising campaign will come to an end towards the end of the month and we will begin evaluating the 2023 advertising buy with our media consultant Luken Benjamin. In addition, we are having preliminary meetings with advertising representatives from various media outlets to review the campaign and begin discussing ideas for next year.

#### **Repellent and Materials Distribution:**

We continue to receive requests for materials and repellent from community organizations. Most recently we donated items to a 5K run sponsored by a non-profit organization called My Sister's House which seeks to eliminate domestic violence in the Asian and Pacific Islander community. Repellent and materials were also provided a Land Park soccer club, Fog Willow Farms for their pumpkin patch attendee's and the Sacramento airport.

#### Social media

Our social media efforts continue and to date we have 14,029 followers on Facebook. Content is focused on ongoing mosquito prevention despite the cooler temperatures, invasive mosquitoes, promotion of media coverage and other mosquito related stories.

#### **Government affairs:**

As part of our ongoing detection of invasive mosquitoes as well as WNV activity, we continue to keep local elected officials informed by sending them email updates with our findings and response activities as needed.

#### **Presentations:**

Classroom presentations are back and this month I gave 4 presentations at 2 different schools. Children were excited to learn about the mosquito lifecycle, mosquito predators and look alikes. In addition, they enjoyed the bug box with various insects and receiving activity books to continue learning. A presentation will also be given to the Sacramento Master Gardner's and to staff at the Effie Yaw Nature Center.

### **MVCAC Public Relations Committee**

As part of the PR Committee standing charges, I continue to be involved in a variety of projects including updating the MVCAC website with all materials and resources produced by the committee, reviewing Spanish language materials, and enhancing a photography database that includes high resolution and quality photos of mosquitoes, field technicians at work, mosquito breeding sources and other photos to be used for materials and social media by all member districts.

# 4. **Board Review and Consideration to Fence Two Ponds**

#### Staff Report:

The District is actively researching ways to produce more mosquitofish (*Gambusia affinis*) on the Elk Grove property. The District currently has 12 fenced ponds that help prevent predators from accessing the fish and reducing our yield. Staff would like to add two additional fenced ponds this year. A fenced pond typically produces an average yield of 250 lbs of fish, while an unfenced pond yield is 175 lbs on average. The cost is approximately \$100 per pound.

The District sought out quotes and interviewed contractors to perform the work which would include installing high strength poles and fencing on two ponds. A summary of the quotes for the services is below and the quotes are attached for your reference. The quotes were all given with the provisions of prevailing wages.

#### NOTICE TO OWNER

NOTICE TO OWNER PROVIDED IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 7018.5 OF THE BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONS CODE
