CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m. by President Raymond LaTorre.

Roll Call

Trustees Christopher Barker and Rosemarie Moore were absent; however, a quorum was present.

3. BOARD REVIEW AND DISCUSSION OF THE 2018-2019 DISTRICT AUDIT

Erica Pastor, partner with Mann, Urrutia, Nelson, CPAs and Associates, LLP, presented the audit report and was available to answer questions. Ms. Pastor indicated the District received an unmodified opinion, meaning they had no significant findings and no compliance issues as part of the audit. Ms. Pastor also indicated that all three items that were discussed in the management letter from the previous year audit had been addressed by staff and no instances were found during this audit. On a motion by Trustee Burnett seconded by Trustee Denny, the Board voted to accept the 2018-2019 Audit. The motion passed by the following vote: Ayes: 10, Noes: 0, Absent: 2

4. REPORTS TO THE BOARD

a. Manager's Report:

The District's West Nile testing season is complete. We will begin testing again in late spring. We are continuing to monitor the invasive mosquito issue in Citrus Heights and the surrounding area. Staff is working on winter projects including maintenance of equipment, the facility, and completing our annual training. The District, in conjunction with Placer MVCD and Greater Los Angeles MVCD, applied for a section 18, emergency exemption, with the California Department of Pesticide Regulation. The section 18 is attempting to get CDPR approval for *Wolbachia* infected male *Aedes aegypti* mosquitoes. We are seeking this approval with CDPR to set the framework for utilizing this control effort in the spring if needed. The MVCAC Quarterly Meeting was held in Visalia on October 29th and 30th. A brief summary of the discussion points from each committee was included in the Board packet. The MVCAC Planning Session will be held in Burlingame on December 3rd and 4th.

b. Reports from District Departments: Written reports were provided in the Board packet from each department. Department supervisors gave an oral presentation and were available to answer any questions.

<u>Lab/Surveillance</u>: Laboratory Director, Marcia Reed discussed department activities including mosquito abundance, EVS surveillance, studies and collaborations in her written report. For her oral report Ms. Reed reviewed the trapping scheme and detections within the areas of concern for *Aedes aegypti* within Citrus Heights and the Pocket area of Sacramento County. Regular trapping in these areas is ongoing and will continue through the winter. The happy bamboo plant that Aedes mosquitoes and eggs were collected from in the Pocket area was on display at the meeting. The plant had been given to a resident as a gift from someone living in southern California where Aedes mosquitoes are more prevalent. This illustrates how they can travel into areas they haven't been detected in yet.

Ecological Management: Ecological Management Supervisor, Marty Scholl discussed department activities including Stormwater/Drainages, UAS Program, the Pool and Aedes Access Enforcement Program, Wetland Program and Winter Brush Access Projects. Leading Edge Aerial finished out this season with over 3,663 acres of UAS treatments under the contracted agreement with the District. The District was able to obtain a blanket warrant for the first time and used it to gain access to nine individual properties for inspections within the Citrus Heights area where *Aedes aegypti* has been detected. Manager Goodman commended Marty Scholl on the time and effort he dedicated to working with legal counsel and the court to obtaining the blanket warrant on behalf of the District.

<u>Biological Control</u>: Fisheries Supervisor, Tony Hedley discussed department activities including fish plants and usage, the ongoing pond dye study, crayfish control challenges, solar aerators and dissolved oxygen levels, and regular maintenance tasks. Fish stalking numbers for October are listed in the written report and 872 lbs of fish have been planted so far in November. This is a busy time of year for Fisheries with the stocking of wetlands and other flooded fields. The District has been looking for an individual or company that can assist with getting the crayfish under control in the District ponds and they started working on it this week. Tony also continues to put together his presentation on dissolved oxygen levels and pond yields for the MVCAC conference in January.

<u>Larval and Adult Control:</u> Program Coordinator, Steve Ramos provided a written report. Manager Goodman provided a brief discussion of the Aerial contract Summary with VDCI and the San Joaquin, Placer and Turlock mosquito districts.

<u>Public Outreach:</u> Public Information Officer, Luz Robles reported on department activities including Invasive Mosquitoes Public Outreach, School Program, Advertising Campaign, Events, and Presentations. Staff is working with a company that is providing assistance with assembly presentations for schools using the mosquito buster theme and activities. They are developing a timeline and script for promoting the fight the bite contest. We are hoping this will help grow the contest and get the District messages out to more students with the goal of holding two assemblies per month. Staff is beginning to compile the list of events to attend for next year; as well as working on selecting the Aedes messaging for the Advertising Campaign for next season.

5. BOARD REVIEW AND CONSIDERATION OF ROOFING CONTRACTORS TO REPAIR BUILDINGS IN WOODLAND AND ELK GROVE

Manager Goodman presented the item and discussed the proposals. On a motion by Trustee Burnett seconded by Trustee McGarvey, the Board voted to authorize staff to contract with Top Rank Heating and Air Conditioning to repair the roofs not to exceed \$50,000. The motion passed by the following vote: Ayes: 10, Noes: 0, Absent: 2

<u>6. BOARD REVIEW AND CONSIDERATION OF TRAILER PURCHASE TO HOUSE THE</u> DISTRICT'S LIBRARY

Manager Goodman presented the item and discussed the plan for the Library.On a motion by Trustee DeAnda seconded by Trustee Denny, the Board voted to authorize staff to purchase a trailer not to exceed \$40,000. The motion passed by the following vote: Ayes: 10, Noes: 0, Absent: 2

Staff Report

The District has typically applied Retrospective Adjustments to the Member Contingency Fund for the payment of annual premiums and maintenance of the fund's prudent balance. At the November 6, 2019, Board of Directors meeting, the VCJPA Board approved the 2019 Annual Reports for both the Pooled Workers' Compensation and Pooled Liability Programs.

In accordance with the five-year equity plan approved by the Board of Directors on April 17, 2019, the Board of Directors elected to retain \$198,000 of the available Liability Program refunds and \$650,000 of the available Workers' Compensation Program refunds in each respective program's non-equity Mid-Layer pool. Accordingly, each active member district's refunds were adjusted by their proportionate share of the amounts retained.

For your reference, we have enclosed excerpts from the annual reports showing the Pooled Program Unobligated Reserves as of June 30, 2019, as well as a copy of the calculation used to adjust the member refunds per the November 6, 2019, Board actions. The complete retrospective adjustment calculations can be found in the 2019 Annual Reports, which are available in the "Members Only" section of the VCJPA website, http://www.vcjpa.org/.

We have also attached an election form which provides the District an option to retain all or a portion of its refund in the Member Contingency Fund. Please review and return this form no later than December 11, 2019. Refunds via check or electronic funds transfer will be issued in December. A copy of November 20, 2019, Member Contingency Fund Prudent Balance schedule is attached for your reference.

a. Manager's Report

The year is at an end and staff is preparing for the upcoming 2020 season with planning, training, and maintenance of the equipment. The District posted a recruitment announcement for Field Technician to fill the vacant positions created by recent retirements.

The District is continuing to move forward with the relocation of the library and the conversion of the lab PCR room. The project is moving quickly due to the diligent work of staff that has been involved in the project.

The MVCAC planning session was held on December 3rd and 4th. The discussion centered on legislative and regulatory priorities for the upcoming year. The MVCAC Board approved the association joining the Vector-Borne Disease Network, a stakeholder group of non-profit organizations focused on supporting vector management as a means to reduce the public health issues caused by arthropod disease vectors.

District staff is continuing to work on the five year plan for future activities and direction of the District. Staff will provide an update to the Board in January on the items highlighted in the five year plan.

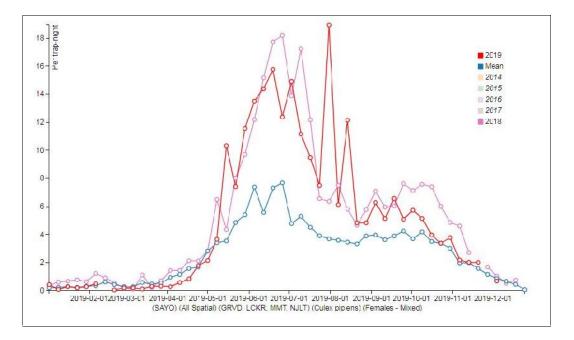

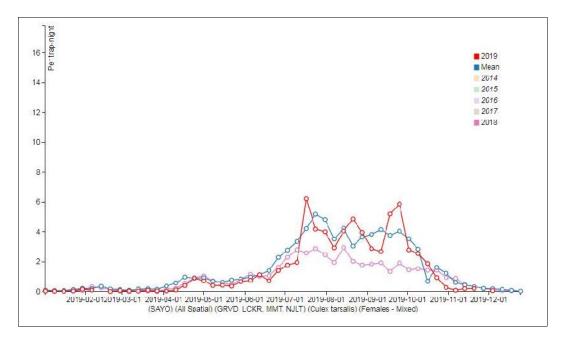
Surveillance:

• Weekly collections – New Jersey Light traps (NJLTs), Locker CO₂ Traps (LCKRs) and Gravid traps (GTs) results are presented in the graphs below. Abundance is low as is typical for this time of year. We are in the process of performing annual maintenance on the weekly traps. In addition we are constructing more locker traps so that we will have them at all weekly trap sites next season.

Encephalitis virus surveillance (**EVS**) – Mosquitoes – The final totals for EVS trapping with CO₂ baited and Gravid traps are 6548 mosquito pools tested with 132 positives found. 73 positive pools were from Sacramento County and 59 were from Yolo County. In addition, there were 49 positive pools found in the city of Davis from trapping performed by a UCD researcher.

Encephalitis virus surveillance (EVS) – Sentinel Chickens – We concluded the season with two positive flocks for West Nile virus. One positive chicken was from the Knight's Landing flock in Yolo County and four positive chickens were from the Gibson Ranch flock in Sacramento County. We plan on keeping the same locations next season for our flocks.

Encephalitis virus surveillance (EVS) – Dead Birds – The final total for this year in the dead bird program is 389 dead birds collected and tested. 51 were found to be positive, of these, 7 were from Yolo County and 44 were from Sacramento County. The dead bird hotline will be opening again in the spring.

Invasive *Aedes spp.* **Surveillance** – We are continuing our monitoring of our *Aedes aegypti* populations in Citrus Heights with BG Sentinel traps. The last detection of one of these mosquitoes was on November 16th. We will continue to check these traps weekly.

Tick and Lyme disease surveillance – We have begun our tick surveillance program for this winter. There are 20 locations which are monitored for the presence of *Ixodes pacificus* ticks. Collected samples will be tested for *Borrelia burgdorferi*.

BG Counter Traps – We have cleaned and stored these traps to be ready for next season's deployment.

Mosquito Resistance Testing – We are conducting bottle bioassay tests during the winter utilizing our colony mosquitoes.

Non-WNV Disease Response Surveillance – In the month of November, we were notified of two imported non-locally acquired dengue human disease cases. We responded with three BG sentinel traps near each location. We did not find any invasive *Aedes* mosquitoes in these traps.

District Studies –

LVL (**Low Volume Larvicide**) **studies** – The results of these treatments are being analyzed and will be presented this winter.

Adulticide Product Trials – We are working on writing up the results of our numerous trials this season and look forward to sharing the results when the analysis is completed.

Vectobac 12AS via rotary atomizers – This trial is being planned for the summer.

Collaborations -

Catch Basin Residue and Resistance study – Dr Gan's lab will be presenting this season's data from our sampling as well as data from Districts in the Central Valley and Southern California this winter. We expect a second phase of this study to be performed next season.

Biogents Pro trap – We are working on summarizing our data from our data collections this winter. The data will be presented at the MVCAC Annual Meeting.

Sugar Bait Project – The results of this seasons work on this new surveillance tool will be presented at AMCA in Portland. We are also determining how we will utilize these sugar baits next season as an integral part of our early spring surveillance program.

Storm Water / Drainages / Planning Programs

<u>City of Sacramento, 4120 Northgate Blvd Development:</u> Staff submitted comments to the City requesting additional information regarding the proposed Stormwater filters, bio swales, and catch basins for the development of a 7-11 and Dutch Bros coffee located at 4120 Northgate Blvd. in Sacramento.

Wetland Program

<u>Fall Flooding:</u> Eight privately owned properties flooded prior to October 1st, 2019 this year for waterfowl hunting. Invoices have been sent to each land owner or wetland manager.

Winter Brush Access Projects

Staff finished 2 brush projects utilizing the District's backhoe and tractor in conjunction with Control Operation's hand crews to not only open up low areas, but to create low flow channels in an effort to prevent or reduce future treatments.





BIOLOGICAL CONTROL Monthly Report for December 2019 Board Meeting

The District stocked a total 85.2 pounds of mosquitofish in the month of November, with 83 pounds stocked in 11 different wetlands, duck clubs and fall flooded ponds by the Fisheries department. These final fish plants finish our stocking season with a total of 3935 pounds checked out for the year. The majority of these fish plants occurred in the summer months for rice fields and fall sources such as wetlands, duck clubs and ponds.

As things slow down we begin repairing all nets, servicing equipment and ordering supplies. The Fisheries department also continued to gather weekly data for all of our ongoing projects including traditional fertilization techniques, crayfish control and the use of solar aerators to maintain dissolved oxygen levels. Daily activities such as tank cleaning were also performed to maintain the high quality of our fish population.

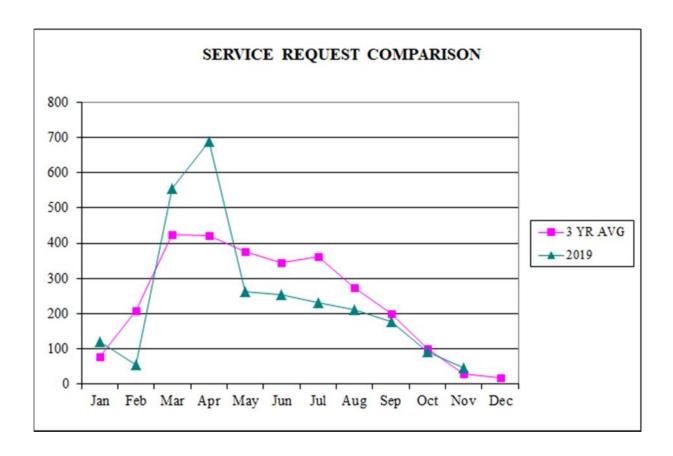

CONTROL OPERATIONS Monthly Report for December 2019 Board Meeting

Field crews performed Best Management Practice projects in both counties during November including Delta Meadows brush clearing and Laguna Del Sol clearing. In house projects are underway at both the Yolo and Sacramento field offices. Catch basin staff has begun updating maps for urban areas with high basin and drain density in preparation for the 2020 season. Winterizing the ULV fleet is scheduled to begin in the early weeks of December. Service requests were steady in the first half of November and then dropped off as the temperatures began to fall as is typical this time of year. There were no aerial treatments in November and are not anticipated to be used again until next spring.

Fight the Bite Contest
